Many Men of Note at Real Estate Convention

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 9.—Representative real estate men from all parts of the Northwest began today the first session of the Interstate Realty convention which will continue thru Saturday. Delegates to the convention have been arriving by special trains and fully five hundred of them are in this city to take part in the three-day program. Speakers listed for today are:

Governor Ernest Lister, of Washington; Governor James Withycombe, of Oregon; Mayor Roy C. Sargent, of Aberdeen; Mayor J. S. McKee, of Hoquiam, and F. E. Taylor, of Portland, the latter the association's president. Papers on chosen subjects will be given by G. D. Shea, of Spokane, on "The Operation of the Federal Land Bank;" by "Farmer" Smith, of the Union Pacific system, on "Soldiers of the Soil," and by R. C. Erskine, of Seattle, on "Locating Industries."

The second day's program covers these papers and addresses: "The Needs of the Hour," by Scott C. Bone, of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer; "Co-operation," Frederick H. Strong, of the Ladd Estate Company, Portland; "The National Association," Tom Ingersoll, executive secretary of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, Minneapolis; "Homes," Paul C. Murphy, of the Laurelhurst Company, Portland; "Colonization," L. J. Bricker, immigration agent of the Northern Pacific Railway, St. Paul; "Why Realtors Need a Code of Ethics," Samuel Collier, Seattle; "Relation of the Bank-

Red Cross Officials Take Army Ranks

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Reorganization of the American Red Cross on a military basis was announced today by Secretary of War Baker.

William H. Taft, chairman of the central committee and directing head of the Red Cross, becomes a major general, and other officials take ranks grading down to first lieutenant.

In explaining the reorganization Secretary Baker made this statement: "These commissions confer no military authority, obligation or other incident to rank or office, nor any right to pay or allowances of similar described grades. They serve as certificates of identity, authorized by the president, indicating to members of the land and naval forces that officials of the ranks indicated are persons in whom the commander-in-chief and the American Red Cross have confidence and for whom the above authority enjoins cooperation in the dispatch of their function, and with the courtesy and respect due to persons designated for important duty to humanity."

Each Red Cross officer will wear proper military insignia. Regulations for uniforms, equipment, etc., are worked out for their guidance.

Only one other major general is designated with Mr. Taft. He is Henry P. Davison of New York, chairman of the war council. Members of the council become brigadier generals as follows: Charles D. Morton, Granison, N. T. Murphy, now in charge of Red Cross units in France. John D. Ryan, Cornelius N. Bliss and Elliott Wadsworth, Harry D. Gibson, director general of the Red Cross, becomes a colonel, with the assistant director general ranking as lieutenant colonels.

RUSSIAN ARMIES ARE BRACING UP

CAPTURE TWO VILLAGES, MANY GUNS AND PRISONERS. HEAVY ARTILLERY DUEL ON IN FLANDERS.

The Russian armies are now on the offensive in the Chotin region in southeastern Galicia.

Yesterday they captured two villages, four machine guns and three hundred prisoners. The British and Germans are in a big gun duel in Flanders. The Germans last night made attacks in the Alsine region. Paris claims the Germans were repulsed. Berlin claims the Germans repulsed attacks of the allies in the north-east.

LOYALTY LEAGUE FORMED

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 9.—The Loyalty League of America has been organized here.

The avowed purpose, as set forth in the constitution, is to "exterminate the I. W. W." It is proposed to extend the league to all parts of the country.

Federal Appraiser Coming Here Soon

Word has just been received by the secretary of the Klamath Falls National Farm Loan Association, to the effect that the Federal Appraiser is viewing the various securities offered in the vicinity of Ashland, will shortly complete his work in that section and will then come to Klamath County for similar work of appraisal.

Many enquiries are constantly being received asking when this work was to be done, and we are pleased to let our farmers of Klamath know

that this progress is being made and that they may expect shortly to know the fate of their application for loans under the Federal Farm Loan Act.

The Federal Land Bank at Spokane also requests that all other associations in Klamath County desiring to secure charters, hasten their work of organization so that if possible all associations may be served at the same time, thus keeping the cost at a minimum.

A member of the appraising committee will accompany the Federal appraiser.

Brutal Wisconsin Crime is Unearthed

LA CROSSE, Wis., Aug. 9.—The discovery of the body of Mrs. Cora Miller, buried in quicklime, in an unused cellar of the home of Edward Haugbe, a farmer, today cleared up the mystery surrounding the disappearance of the woman. She disappeared on February 24 last. Haugbe has not been found but a warrant for his arrest has been issued.

Mrs. Miller was wealthy, among the farms she owned being that on which her body was found. She had rented this property to Haugbe. When Mrs. Miller disappeared a letter was received by friends intimating that she had eloped. It is now believed that this was forged by the slayer.

Peace Offer With Joker Expected Soon

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Germany will make a big peace move this fall officials here believe.

But they caution it probably will be, as previously, a made-in-Germany peace, which would place the kaiser in the light of victory before his people.

They admit this nation would listen to a serious, bona fide peace proposal, now or any time, but from information in government possession, Germany has no intention of making any such proffer, and any she now makes will have a joker somewhere in it.

President Wilson discourages any peace talk at this time. He has let it be known that America is in the war up to the hilt, and that even congressional peace debate now would only serve to belaud the issue and hamper war preparations.

Despite the almost impossible task of crushing thru the west front with present tactics war department heads maintain confidence in the outcome, indicating to observers that they probably have some "new tricks" in store for turning that vast front. Some say the end will come before 1919.

Soldiers' Tobacco Lost

WASHINGTON, August 9.—The Young Men's Christian Association's shipment of tobacco for the American troops in France has been lost.

Word has been received from Paris from the Red Cross Commission to France saying that no suitable tobacco to replace the lost shipment was obtainable there and urged that ten tons of tobacco be sent at once.

The Red Cross Council immediately accepted an offer of the Liggett & Myers Tobacco Company to donate 1,500,000 cigarettes, 20,000 packages of smoking tobacco and 10,000 cuts of chewing tobacco, which will be forwarded to the American troops at once.

France has agreed to admit the tobacco free of duty as well as all other articles for the American troops.

MANY APPLY FOR TRAINING CAMPS

HONOLULU, T. H., Aug. 9.—Applications by the score are being received daily at headquarters of the Hawaiian Department of men of Honolulu and other parts of the Territory who want to join the civilian training camp that, under the orders received last week from the war department, is to be established at Schofield Barracks, twenty-five miles north of this city.

The number of men to be admitted to the camp is limited to 100, which includes the ten originally selected by the officers of the Hawaiian Department to go to the Presidio camp at San Francisco. It is estimated by those in charge of preparations for the camp, which will open August 15, that not less than 500 applications will receive before that date.
