Draft Regulations Are Made Clear by Board

PORTLAND, Or., August 10.—Un-
der the name of an act actually passed
by his local exemption board as called
up for physical examination, any
man subject to the draft is free to
enlist as a volunteer in the Army or
Navy of the United States.

Much misunderstanding has arisen
on this point, but the foregoing state-
ment may be taken as official and
correct.

After a man has once been notified
to appear for physical examination,
he is subject to the military author-
ity and can no longer enlist as a
volunteer. But until that time there
is no restriction against voluntary
enlistment on his part.

Voluntary enlistments made since
June 30 will not be credited against
the quota on the first draft of the
state and of the county from which
these volunteers come. But assur-
ance has been given by the Provost
Marshal General at Washington that
they probably will be credited against
the next draft.

The interests of every county in
the state, no matter how remote, are
very carefully guarded in the matter
of giving credit for voluntary enlist-
ments.

If a man from Harney County, for
example, enlists in Portland, the en-
listment is not credited to Multnomah
County but to Harney County. The
home county of the man enlisting in
every case receives the credit.

Russian Republic Is Certain, Says Root

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—A Rus-
sian Republic is certain to result
from the revolution in that country,
in the opinion of Elihu Root, head
of the American mission which has
returned from its three months' visit
to report to President Wilson.

In Root's opinion only the over-
whelming of the country by German
armies, making impossible further
development in the formation of the
new government, can prevent the
erection of the Russian Republic.

Internal difficulties are being over-
come and the process of crystaliza-
tion is going on rapidly; the extreme
elements which threatened serious
trouble have been brought under
control and, given due opportunity
and time and such as America can
render in material and moral sup-
port, in Root's opinion, the Russian
Republic is a certainty.

The mission returned filled with
optimism over conditions in the new
Republic and the chances of Russia
doing her part to the end in the great
war.

Charles Edward Russell, another
member of the mission who recently
withdrew from the Socialist Party in
this country, declared that the chief
duty of the United States is to con-
vince the Russian people that the
United States is in the war to the
finish.

Talk of peace at this time and
arguments against sending our boys
to France is utter rot. We must go
through this war to the end, and our
citizens might as well make up their
minds to that effect. Slackers,
peace and home guard talk has no
place in this situation at present.

I. W. W. THREATEN BIG REVOLUTION

PHILADELPHIA MEMBERS DE-
CLARE THAT A REPETITION
OF THE BUTTE LYNCHING WILL
BRING DEADLY RESULTS

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 10.—"Dead-
ly results to the ruling classes" are
threatened in telegrams received by
Governor Stewart from Eastern locals
of the I. W. W., should other mem-
bers of the I. W. W. be lynched.

Philadelphia members threaten a
strike throughout the East in the event
another I. W. W. is lynched or de-
ported.

A telegram was sent by the Detroit
Workers' Defense league, addressed
to the governor of Montana and read-
ing as follows:

"The act of the law and order mob
in lynching Frank Little in Butte
forebodes strife and discord for the
states, and unless these acts of law
and order mobs are stopped a repeti-
tion of the Russian revolution will
be enacted here, with its deadly re-
sults to the ruling classes. Remember,
we never forget."

The governor received telegrams
from Philadelphia and Pittsburgh or-
ganizations to the same effect.

POULTRY MEN TO MEET

A meeting of the western mem-
bers of the American Association of
Poultry Instructors and Investigators
will be held at the Oregon Agricul-
tural College Aug. 13 and 14, to in-
vestigate the emergency conditions
and changes of methods necessitated
by the war. Poultry specialists are
expected from the agricultural col-
leges of ten western states and prov-
inces, says Prof. James Dryden, at
whose suggestion the meeting was
called. From as far north as Saskat-
chewan and as far south as New
Mexico, these specialists are expected
to assemble to study and confer on
poultry ways and means most profit-
able to the industry and nation.

ASTORIA STOPS TEACHING GERMAN

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 10.—French
is to be substituted for German in
the language department of the As-
toria high school. The board of trus-
tees decided to begin no more classes
in German. Second year German,
however, will be taught, so that the
students may complete their course.

LATE WEDDINGS DO NOT COUNT

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 10.—Men
married since June 20, 1917 will
not be exempted from service in the
new draft army on the grounds of
having dependant wives, according to
new exemption rules sent Adjutant
General George A. White by Provost
Marshal General Crowder.

LOAN OVERSUBSCRIBED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 10.—
Over-subscription of the \$200,000,000
issue of short term treasury certifi-
cates of indebtedness, Secretary Mc-
Adoo has announced, totaled \$21-
550,000, more than 20 per cent.

Allotment will be approximately
83 per cent of subscription.

rendering any first aid that might

POOR SPECIMENS AT BEND

BEND, Or., Aug. 10.—One hundred
and fifty Deschutes County men will
have to be examined before the
county's quota of 37 for the first
draft is made up, according to Dr. B.
Ferrell, examiner for the county con-
scription board. Twenty were exam-
ined Tuesday, 10 being disqualified
for physical disability, and already
30 claims for exemption have been
filed. As many more are expected
by the board. Poor sight, defective
hearing, varicose veins and fallen ar-
ches were the chief causes for rejec-
tion.

Pine Grove Irrigation District.
Whereas, under the provisions of
chapter 357, General Laws of Ore-
gon for 1917, said County Court, on
the 3d day of August, 1917, made
and entered an order designating and
establishing Pine Grove Irrigation
District, with the following bound-
aries, to-wit:

Beginning at the northwest cor-
ner of the NE 1/4 of the NE 1/4, sec-
tion 7, township 38 south, range
10, E. W. M.; thence due east to
the northeast corner of NE 1/4 of
NW 1/4, section 8, same township
and range; thence south to center
of said section 8; thence east to
northeast corner of NW 1/4 of SE 1/4,
same section; thence south to center
of the SE 1/4 of said section 8;
thence east to northeast corner of
SE 1/4 of SW 1/4 of section 9, said
township and range; thence south
to southeast corner of SW 1/4 of
section 9; thence east to the north-
east corner of NW 1/4 of the NE 1/4,
section 16, said township and
range; thence south to a point in-
tersecting the right of way of the
United States Reclamation Service
Main and East Branch Canal at the
southeast corner of the SW 1/4 of
the SE 1/4, in said section 16, same
township and range; thence along
the northerly limit of said right
of way, in a westerly direction to
a point where said right of way
intersects the section line between
sections 17 and 20, in said town-
ship and range; thence west to the
southwest corner of the SW 1/4 of
said section 17; thence north to the
southwest corner of the NW 1/4 of
the NW 1/4, said section 17, same
township and range; thence east to
the southwest corner of NE 1/4 of
NE 1/4, section 18, said township
and range; thence north to place
of beginning; all in Klamath Coun-
ty, Oregon.

Now, therefore, for the purpose of
determining whether or not such dis-
trict shall be organized under the
provisions of said act, an election will
be held at Pine Grove school house,
in said district, in said county and
state, on the 4th day of September,
1917, which election will be held at
eight o'clock in the morning, and will
continue until seven in the evening.

of said day, at which the qualified
electors therein shall cast ballots
which shall contain these words:
IRRIGATION DISTRICT—YES
IRRIGATION DISTRICT—NO
Or words equivalent thereto.

There shall also be elected at such
time and place three directors for
said district, whose term of office
shall expire in one, two and three
years, respectively, from the first
Tuesday in February, next succeed-
ing their election. The nominations
of candidates for said offices may be
made by petition, signed by at least
ten of the electors in said proposed
district, qualified to vote for the offi-
cers so nominated, or at an assembly
of not less than twenty-five of said
electors, which said nominations, by
petition or by assembly, shall be filed
with the undersigned at least ten
days next preceding the date of said
election.

Hunsaker Suggests Measures of Caution

FIRE CHIEF BELIEVES "A STITCH
IN TIME SAVES NINE" AND AD-
VISES PUBLIC TO SAFEGUARD
ITS INTERESTS.

Suggestions for mill owners and
property owners as to proper prepa-
ration for possible accidents are given
by timely suggestions offered by
Fire Chief J. W. Hunsaker.

Careful attention to this word of
advice later may prove of great value
to those who heed it.

To Owners of Mills and Warehouses:
Have you a competent watchman?
Try him. If he is not the right man,
get another. Have you a fire fight-
ing apparatus on the place. Moments
count. A spark may mean a blaze;
a blaze a conflagration. Roll
out the old barrels; fill them full
of water. Place a ten cent package
of baking soda in every seven and
one-half gallons of water and you
have as good a carbonic acid gas fire
extinguisher as can be desired. Train
every man on the job just what to
do if a fire should happen. Drill
them from time to time to see that
they are doing it. Keep a supply of
sacks handy beside the barrels. These
sacks soaked with this liquid are a
great aid.

Put all rubbish in metal cans. Al-

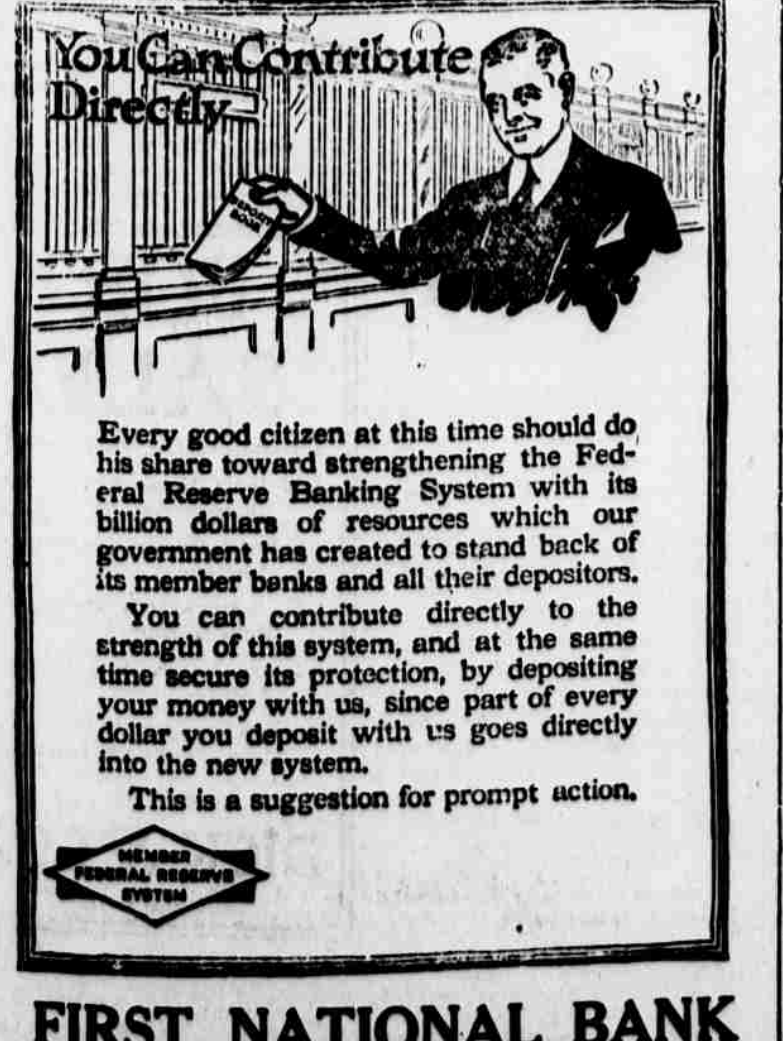
low nothing to gather on the floors,
in the corners or under the build-
ings. Be responsible yourself for
the cleanliness of the building. This
is your bit. Never keep a man on
the place who persists in smoking
near the mill or warehouse. Never
allow a stranger inside the building.
If you have not thought of these
things before, your duty as a citizen
calls them to your attention now.
This is no time for waiting. Your
grain may be insured but you cannot
eat the money; neither can the boys
in France.
