

Commission Adverse to Sending Men to Russia

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11—Emphatic disapproval of the suggestion that American troops be sent to the eastern front was brought home by all except one of the members of the American mission to Russia. It was authoritatively stated tonight that Charles Edward Russell is the only commissioner who believes it desirable to put soldiers from the United States in Russia and that the others are convinced that their presence would be detrimental rather than helpful to the armies of the new democracy. Elihu Root and his associates on the mission lunched with Secretary Lansing today and told him more of their experiences and conclusions. Their written report, submitted to President Wilson yesterday, probably will not be made public. Organization and encouragement and not men, it was explained tonight are Russia's needs in the opinion of the majority of the commissioners. With 6,000,000 men under arms they think Russia requires no more soldiers, particularly she does not need a few thousand strange soldiers, speaking an unfamiliar tongue, drawing better pay and eating better food than her own men. As an aid to actual fighting, it was pointed out, the small number of American troops that could be maintained in Russia would be of little or no value.

Commission Orders More Direct Routing

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11—In a tentative order the interstate commerce commission has held that the practice of railroads and their connecting lines operating in lumber districts of participating in an arrangement for the movement of lumber from the mill by a circuitous and out of line route, and of collecting in this way extra hauling charges, is unlawful and wasteful. The commission held that any charge exceeding two or three dollars per car to cover the switching charges would be unlawful, and that charges for hauling must be made on the basis of the most direct route.

Publicity on Draft Work Is Asked By the People

Exemption Boards Ordered to Furnish Press With Names of All Proffering Excuses. Suggested That Neighbors Might Aid in Uncovering Frauds

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 11—All the light that publicity can give is to be turned, on applications for exemption or discharge from military service under the draft.

The United States Government believes a man's neighbors can sometimes supply some interesting information as to the real motives behind an application for exemption or discharge. So the Government is taking steps to see that the neighbors, and the public generally, have every opportunity to find out, through the newspapers, what men have asked exemption, and the reason they have assigned for asking it.

To insure the necessary publicity, all local exemption boards, by direction of the Provost Marshal General

at Washington, have received positive instructions from the Adjutant General at Portland immediately to make available to the press the names of all persons claiming exemption or discharge, and the grounds on which such claims are based.

If any person has information contrary to the facts as alleged by the claimant, the government representatives—who usually is the county attorney—will investigate.

If he finds the claimant wrongfully stated the facts, the government representative will inform the local board and, if necessary, carry the case on appeal to the district board.

Thus the interests of other men who would be called up for service ahead of their proper time if exemptions were granted to men ahead of

them not entitled to exemption, will be protected.

In explaining the reason for making this order to local boards, the Provost Marshal General said, in part:

"The names of all registered men are on a list arranged in the order in which they will be called for military service. Wherever any registered person imposes upon a local board and improperly secures a certificate of exemption or discharge, he advances the time of call of all other un-called persons on the list."

"For this reason every registered person and, to some extent, every person in the community is more or less directly interested in seeing that the true facts are brought to the attention of the Government."

SCHULTZ CLAIMS STOCK POISONED

ASSERTS HOWEVER, IN PAPER READ AT SALEM, THAT MUCH STOCK IS LOST HERE THROUGH CONTAMINATED WATER

The suspicions of the stockmen of Klamath County, that many of their losses were occasioned by poisoning is confirmed by Dr. C. A. Schultz the eminent scientist of Seattle who came here last week and made an extensive examination of the matter, although it is maintained by the doctor that a majority of the deaths were

due to an infection obtained in contaminated water.

A paper giving the findings of Dr. Schultz on his trip to Klamath was read Wednesday at the annual meeting of the Oregon State Live Stock Sanitary Board. It is asserted by the doctor in his report that more stock had been poisoned in California than in Oregon.

Dr. Schultz intimated before leaving Klamath Falls that much stock was being lost in the county by infected food and drink, but would make no statement until he had reached home and analyzed the data which he had gathered. It is expected that he will forward a paper for publication here in the near future, giving opinions as to causes of some of the stock losses and some simple remedies by which they can be reduced.

Dr. Schultz is a veterinarian member of the Seattle Sanitary Board, and was attracted to Klamath County on reading the report that a hundred and fifty thousand dollars worth of livestock had been lost here by poison at the time of the recent I. W. W. agitation.

MANY KILLED BY EXPLOSION

SCORES ARE KILLED AND INJURED BY EXPLOSION WHICH WRECKED A BIG CHEMICAL WORKS IN EAST LONDON

LONDON, Aug. 11—An explosion and big fire in a chemical works in East London Thursday night wrecked the building and injured scores of workers.

Thirteen bodies of women have been taken so far from the ruins. Many of the injured are being treated in the police stations. The officers are still searching for bodies.
