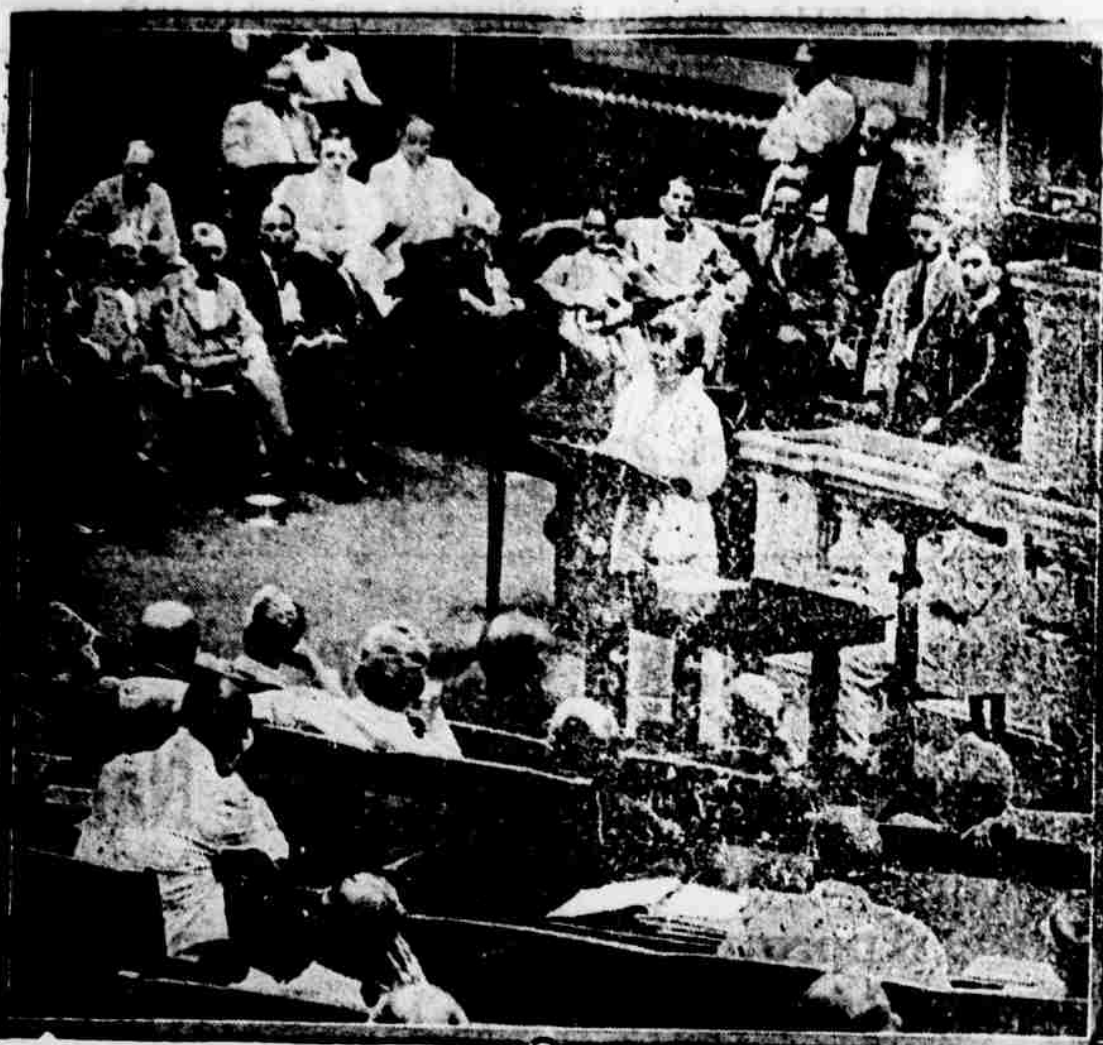

## Kaiser Is Declared Dupe of Counselors

**Noted Cartoonist Says Head Officials Palaver William Who Is Religious Bigot and a Hopeless Egotist**

The following is an extract from an interview in the Philadelphia Ledger, quoting Louis Raemakers, the Dutch artist, who has become the most famous cartoonist in the world because of his war cartoons:

There seems to be an idea here that all that is bad in Germany is summed up in the kaiser; that if the kaiser were to be assassinated or to abdicate today all would be well with the world tomorrow. That is very silly.

The kaiser is the tool, the dupe, of those about him. He is a child. Let him believe himself the all-wise and the all-powerful, and he is clay in the hands of cleverer men. He is content with the shadow. The substance is elsewhere.

You know what his father said of him to Bismarck:

"Look out for Wilhelm," he told Bismarck. "He is as stupid as he is square-headed. He is a religious bigot and a hopeless egotist."

If all the Hohenzollern dynasty should die today and Scheidemann or even Leibknecht should become president of a German republic tomorrow, it would not alter Germany.

Germany is an idea. The modern German has been so insistently and methodically taught that he is a superman, chosen by God to impose his will on the world. He never doubts it. The German socialist is no exception.

There is only one way to reach the modern German. Beat him over the head. He understands nothing else. The world must go on beating him over the head until he says "enough." Otherwise, the world can never live with him.

## MIX UP IN JAIL LATE YESTERDAY

**SCRAP AMONG THE INDUSTRIAL WORKERS NECESSITATES THE INTERFERENCE OF SHERIFF AND DEPUTY**

Rumor of a serious discord between the Germans and the Austrians reached the ears of the officers here late yesterday. In fact, the discord became so manifest that it could be distinctly heard at the police headquarters, and the sheriff's office was immediately notified.

Answering the summons, Sheriff Humphrey and Deputy Griffith were attracted at once to a melee in the city jail below, where the I. W. W. vagrants are confined. Dodging between the cups and saucers of A. J. Wiggins which were flying promiscuously thru the air, they succeeded in separating and pacifying Martin Vultch of Austria and one Kniggle of Germany, who were breaking the crockery on each other in a most enterprising manner.

The men were soon quieted, however, and no one is much the worse for the affair, according to report, except Mr. Wiggins.
