

Wants War Profits To Foot the Bill

Sen. LaFollette Recommends That Big Incomes Be Source of Taxation to Meet National War Needs

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 15.—A minority report of the senate finance committee on the war tax bill has been presented by Senator LaFollette with the concurrence of Senators Gore and Thomas, recommending that war profits of big incomes be utilized as principal sources

of taxation in providing funds for national war needs. It says that war tax bills now are placed on those least able to bear it.

"England has taxed her war profits 50 per cent without impairing her industries," declared LaFollette.

"Her wealthy classes have never received larger incomes than now."

AMBROSE TELLS OF MARINE LIFE

EX-FIRE CHIEF DECLARES THAT
MARINES ARE THE BEST PART

In a letter just received by the ladies of the Woman's Relief Corps, Keith Ambrose, formerly fire chief and now of the U. S. Marines at Mare Island, tells of some of his experiences and of the respect for our national emblem that is instilled into the boys of the army. His letter follows in part:

"Well, I have finally got located, took the oath on the 16th of July, and have been very busy since then drilling. This branch of the government service is fine. I like it better every day, and think if I ever had it to do over again, this is the place I would come. I believe if there is any good in a man, this is a good place to show it, and one can have a good time, too.

"If every United States citizen would spend a few months in some government camp just to learn to pay due respects to the good old flag that is so often overlooked, it would be a fine thing. Believe me, they don't overlook it here. Every morning at 8 o'clock, when it is hoisted, everybody on the island stands at attention, and the same in the evening, when it is lowered. Every time it is passed we have to salute it, and right now I am proud to have the chance to pay the respect to it that was overlooked by me and most everybody else in civil life.

"I will always have a soft spot in my heart for Klamath Falls and the people there. I didn't have any idea I would miss it like I have, and whenever the occasion arises for me to boost that place I will certainly be glad to do it. It will be home to me just as soon as I am thru here."

J. L. HANKS HAS PASSED

PIONEER OF KLAMATH COUNTY
DIES AT GLENDALE—PROMI-
NENT FIGURE IN EARLY HIS-
TORY OF COUNTY

News of the death of James Louis Hanks, one of the pioneers of Klamath County, was received yesterday by his son, County Judge Marion Hanks, who left for Glendale, in Douglas County, immediately on receipt of the tidings.

Mr. Hanks was 97 years old, and had been very feeble for more than a year. His death was the result of old age infirmities. He was one of the prominent men of Klamath County, being identified with its early history in several official capacities.

Mr. Hanks was born in Decatur, Illinois, in 1820. The Hanks family was related to President Lincoln, and their two farms adjoined in Illinois. Hanks and Lincoln were boys together, and served in the same company in the Black Hawk war. With his family Hanks crossed the plains in 1853, and stopped in Douglas County, where he was engaged in mining. In 1873 he came to Klamath County, where he first engaged in freighting. He took up a homestead soon after near this city, where the Pelican Bay Lumber company now stands.

Mr. Hanks was elected county treasurer in 1876 and sheriff in 1878. He also served one term as county commissioner. The following children, John, Marion, Ella, Melinda, Emma, Jesse, Effie and Louis, were born to Mr. and Mrs. Hanks. Mrs. Hanks died early this spring.

BUTTE HUNGER STRIKE IS SHORT LIVED

BUTTE, Mont., Aug. 15.—They have the strike habit in Butte.

The last word in strikes developed when it was learned that prisoners in the county jail had been on a "hunger strike" for seven days, for better food.

Frank Fisher and John O'Neill, murderers under sentence of death, started the strike. It rolled along merrily until other prisoners learned that the instigators had been eating all the time from a cache of food in their cells.

Then the strike was called off.

BRITISH CLERKS OVERWORKED

LONDON, Aug. 15.—Wartime tasks have so burdened some of the town clerks that one, at least, has protested, asserting that he now works from 9 o'clock in the morning until 11 o'clock at night, and that if the authorities add to his already multi-arious duties, he will have to go without sleep. In his protest he gives the following list of wartime duties to which he already was required to attend.

National registration, wartime cookery demonstrations, war hospitals, food economy campaign, local flag days, national service, occasional baby weeks, communal kitchens, allotments, potato spraying, local coal supplies, maternity and child welfare, local distribution and separation allowances.

A proposal to require him to administer food supplies aroused his revolt.

Inhuman Turks Will Devastate Holy Land

CAIRO, Egypt, July 30.—(Correspondence of Associated Press)—The situation in Palestine this summer is the most serious since the war began. A scheme for the looting of Jerusalem is already being executed, and throughout the country the Turk has embarked on a calculated policy of plundering and killing the native inhabitants, so that if they are forced to vacate the country they will leave behind them a desert.

The only thing that can save them is the hope that buoys them up is that the British army now hammering at the gates of the Holy Land may soon drive out the Turks.

The following statement of the present situation is given to the Associated Press by an official in touch with conditions:

The attitude of the Young Turks toward the unfortunate non-Turkish races within their empire has always been harsh and oppressive. During the war it has been an open campaign of robbery, exploitation and massacre, for the Young Turks, realizing that the partition of the lands under their rule is unavoidable, have determined to get as much as they can out of the inhabitants while they are in possession.

The stupendous wickedness of the extermination of the Armenian nation cannot be dismissed as a mere device of Oriental statecraft or as a particular measure aimed at one particular race, for it is the Turkish policy toward not only Armenians, but Arabs, Greeks and Jews; in fact, all peoples who are subjects of the Turks but not themselves of Turkish blood.

While there was some prospect of being able to retain or even enlarge their empire, the Turks did not actually seek to destroy their subject races. Today, knowing themselves doomed, it is their calculated policy to kill off the bulk of the inhabitants of Palestine and extort the last ounce of money and goods from them, so that if they are forced to vacate the country they will leave behind them a desert, a poverty stricken and depopulated land.

Their policy is not consistent with military or economic needs, and is not supported by even the slenderest pretenses for its necessity. It is dictated solely by a savage brutality. The modern Young Turk of the committee of union and progress is an infinitely worse tyrant than his predecessors, and all his native savagery and blood lust now finds vent in deliberate and organized crimes. Germany has exercised no restraining influence, and, indeed, shares largely in the Ottoman guilt.

Palestine is today somewhat cut off from the world, and news of the dreadful happenings within its borders reaches civilization slowly.

The disaster that befell the Armenian nation is now being meted out to the mixed non-Turkish population of Syria and Palestine. Families are being massacred, towns and territories evacuated, communities plundered and given over to pillage.

The town of Gaza was recently ordered evacuated. In pursuance of the order the inhabitants were forced to set out upon their journey with nothing but the clothes they wore. All their belongings were left in their homes, and these were delivered over to the Turkish troops for loot.

There were the usual scenes of wanton destruction and willful defiance; no women were spared the customary accompaniment of a Turkish visitation.

Gaza having been pillaged and the soldiers not yet being satisfied, it was proposed to carry out the same program at Jerusalem.

The head notables, however, protested that, having seen the exhibition at Gaza, they preferred to chance the risks of war to enduring certain agony of a forced evacuation.

This answer and protest displeased the pasha so much that he promptly had the deputation transported to Anatolia, and imitating special measures to see that his scheme for looting Jerusalem is not hindered by organized resistance among the inhabitants.

The system of oppression in Palestine is thoro, but it is also stupid and wasteful. Cavalry horses are allowed to graze on such of the scanty young crops as the wretched inhabitants have been able to grow, so that there will be no grain this year in a country which is already well nigh bare of corn.
