INJUSTICE IS DECLARED DONE

ATTORNEYS FOR FRANK CORPENING AT OLENE ISSUE REPLY TO YESTERDAY'S ARTICLE IN THE HERALD

Editor Evening Herald:

In justice to our client, Mr. Corpening, we cannot permit the article in your paper of yesterday evening to pass unchallenged.

In the first place, in calling attention to the value placed upon the tract of land by the assessor, the attorney for the railroad is trying to get before the people from whom jurors must be selected, a matter that he knows, or should know, would not be competent evidence in court. This is a species of pettifogging that cannot be too strongly condemned, and it is not difficult to understand the embarrassment resulting from such work when it comes to the selection of a jury.

The headlines of the article show a disposition on the part of the writer of same to cast a slur on the estimate placed upon his property by Mr. Corpening. The article is also unfair in stating that the whole tract of land has been assessed at a certain sum, and that the amount offered by the railroad company is so much in excess of such valuation per acre, without stating the character of the land required as compared to the whole tract. We do not want to attempt to try our side of the case in the newspapers, and we shall not rush to the printing office with something that cannot be an issue in the case when the attorney for the railroad serves us with his reply, but if he has any sense of fairness let him state that the railroad in trying to take the acreage mentioned from the most valuable portion of our client's land, and taking it in a way that leaves the remaining tillable land practically worthless. On the land sought are located a barn, stable, store, and other buildings. Now how does land with such improvements, including land that produces four tons of alfalfa per acre, compare with the balance of the rocky hillside at Olene?

We are inclined to the opinion that it pays to be fair, even in a lawsuit, and it also pays a newspaper man to be on his guard against the attorney who never has anything to offer in the way of news except litigation in which he is interested as a lawyer.

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New Job For Power Company

In getting the new meters installed in Klamath Falls to meet the stipulations of the new public service commission rulings, the California-Oregon Power company here is lined up for a big job, as it is estimated that there will have to be about 1,000 meters put in.

As previously published, the decision rendered last month by the public service commission regulating the light and water rates of the California Oregon Power company thruout Southern Oregon and Northern California, while not endeavoring to make a definite change in the manner of computing them, one of these changes being the abolishing of the flat rate for light heretofore in vogue.

The commission holds that this rate must be unfair, because by it the person who turns off his lights and uses them sparingly, must help to pay for the light that some other

man wastes by carelessly allowing them to burn.

Orders from the commission are to have the lights installed by September 1st, but as a very large part of the Klamath Falls customers have been under the flat rate, the company fears that it will be an impossibility to have the meters installed by this date, and will appeal to the commission for more time in which to complete the work.

A crew of men will be put at the work as soon as the meters can be secured. The company estimates that the installation of a meter, including its cost, is \$15, and the new ruling by the commission will therefore cost it \$15,000.
