SUCCESSFUL AIR RAID IS MADE

BRITISH AIRMEN DROP TONS OF BOMBS ON RAILWAY JUNCTION AT OSTEND—ALL RETURN WITHOUT INJURY

LONDON, Aug. 18.—The royal navy air service aviators Thursday raided military objectives in Belgium, dropping many tons of bombs on the Ostend Railway station, throughout the railway junction and on the sidings, according to official announcement.

The airdrome at Ghistel was bombed. Several fires were observed after the raid.
The airplanes all returned safely.

Two companies of soldiers have been formed among the prisoners of here, under the command of George Sing Sing, the famous prison of New York state. They drill every afternoon, as shown in the photograph. Some of the men will shortly finish their terms of confinement, and all have said they will join the army if they can do so.

All Ladies Are Asked to Knit**Stirring Appeal Made By Local Member of Organization to Come to Aid of Those Across the Sea**

The American woman's position in this, our greatest national struggle, has just been emphasized in the following official communication at the local Red Cross headquarters.

It is a stirring plea to all our women to come to the aid of humanity, and to come quickly. Winter is coming, and the race is on between death from cold and exposure and our willingness to get our offerings of warm knitted garments to the suffering people and our soldiers on the battle line in Flanders and France.

Our mothers knitted for the boys in blue and the boys in gray, and have received blessings for it, but never have the women of any country been called upon to knit for their own soldier boys and for the poor, starved, abused, suffering civil population of our brave French and Belgian allies. Think of our own boys doing soldier duty in the awful weather of a Flemish winter, unprotected and with sudden death always hovering over them. Is a knitted sweater or a pair of socks too good for them?

Think of the little, pitiful, half-famished children and the old people who can never see the grass grow again in their native land unless clothes to warm their poor, emaciated bodies reach them before the bitter autumn winds from the North Sea.

For the sake of the All Merciful One come forward and do your share of knitting. You will have the satisfaction of knowing that every warm stitch helps to save some life—perhaps to save a Belgian or a French life until the day when they can see their native land redeemed.

Here is the appeal:
"An appeal has come to the American Red Cross from Major Grayson M. P. Murphy, Red Cross commissioner for Europe, for 1,500,000 knitted sets comprising sweater, muffler, wristlets and socks, and we in turn are about to call on the chapters throughout the United States for the production of these articles.

To simplify the knitting as much as possible, we now have in the printers' hands a new and complete manual of instruction for making the several articles required.

The Red Cross supply bureau is arranging for a large supply of yarn and knitting needles, to meet the requirements of the chapters. Within the next two weeks we expect to have the knitting circular ready for distribution to the chapters, and large ship-

ments of yarn will be coming into the various branch supply houses.

Desperate need will exist for these articles among the soldiers and civil population of France and our other allies before we can get the articles made. To expedite the completion of the work, we should like to have you start at once, and without waiting for the new knitting manual to prepare for the work, and we suggest the following:

1—Form in your chapter a committee on knitting.
2—Mobilize all available knitters in your chapter, branches and auxiliaries, so that when the knitting manual is received everyone who can knit will be ready to start work at once.

3—Make it clear that we seek the aid in this big undertaking of all knitters, whether they are members of the Red Cross or not.

4—A group of persons qualified to instruct in knitting will be a great help to the committee.

Remember, this will be a rush order—quick action—quick results.

They have gained some slight advantages along the Verdun front, otherwise the only result of the attacks was to increase the heavy loss which they have sustained in the fierce local offensive operations of late.
