Press Comments On Peace Proposals

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Typical New York morning papers comment on the pope's peace proposal as follows:

World—It is fair to presume that the pope has not made a formal proposal looking toward peace without full consultation with the government at Vienna. In any case the first response to the vatican proposals must come from the German government.

Herald—In his present proposal the pope speaks a word that the German government has not yet been able to bring itself to speak—"restoration." . . . When the hideous blight of Prussianism is destroyed forever, the German people can have peace, not before.

Times—Of the awful bloodshed, the costs and the horrors of war, the whole world has grown so weary that the allies assuredly will not let this opportunity go without making faithful use of it. Unmistakably, it is a peace overture, and it comes from the Teutonic powers.

Sun—The difficulty of appraising peace proposals couched in general

terms—even when inspired by a purpose as noble as that of Pope Benedict, is encountered at the very first contact with the suggested outline. As to Belgium, for instance, what is meant by restoration? Restoration that means no more than the criminal's withdrawal from the scene of his unspeakable crimes, or restoration that means reparation, restitution and indemnity?

Staats Zeitung—A peace proposal from the pope, whose neutrality is above suspicion, should be accorded a considerate hearing. Yet the proposal of the vatican was not off the wires before it was met with the charge of being another German trick. Who amongst us, whose vision is not red with blood and lust for blood, will deny that it merits respectful examination, discussion and attention?

Chicago Herald—The papal appeal to all belligerents to compose their differences on certain bases roughly outlined, gives Germany again the opportunity to be concrete, which it has heretofore so resolutely rejected.

German Bread Said to Lack Nourishment

ZURICH, Switzerland, Aug. 18.—Five members of the minority socialist party of the German reichstag are reported to have given notice that they will ask the chancellor if he is aware that the bread now being supplied to the German people is composed as follows:

24 per cent flour, 21 per cent lupine, 17 per cent chestnuts, 14 per cent acorns, 13 per cent bark of trees, 6 per cent wood shavings, 4 per cent potato peel, 2 per cent of a miscellaneous indefinite mixture.

GOOD MARKET FOR ENGLISH FARM LAND

LONDON, Aug. 18.—The effect of the corn production bill on the value of land thruout the country is most marked, and there are more inquiries for farms and small estates than can possibly be satisfied. The speculator and financier are said to be already operating, and instances are quoted of agricultural land changing owner-

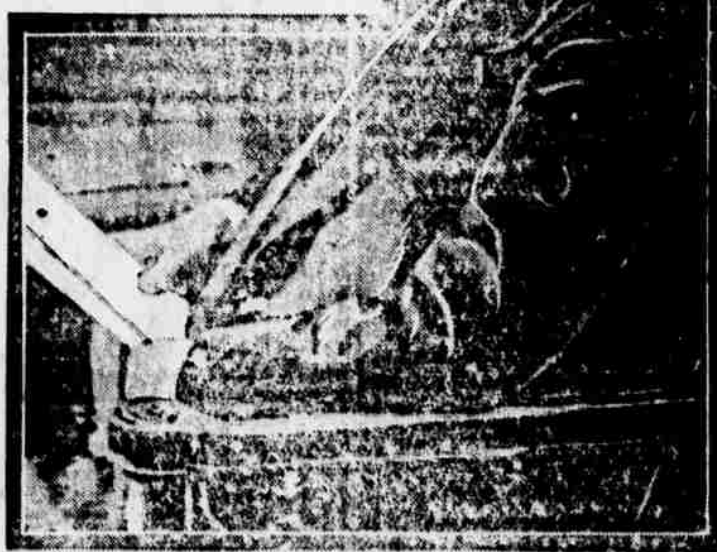
ship twice a week, each time at a profit.

A prominent auctioneer at Devizes, Wiltshire, said land was selling better now than for twenty-five years, and during the present month his firm has disposed of over \$6,000,000 worth at from \$75 to \$400 an acre.

Many of the inquiries for estates of between 5,000 and 6,000 acres are for the purpose of settling soldiers and sailors on after the war.

"Little Commonwealth" Success in England

DORSET, England, Aug. 18.—Down in Dorsetshire there has been established a "republic" called the "Little Commonwealth," which has its own coinage, and which is used as a reformatory for youngsters from 2 years of age upward. The experiment has proved a suc-

cess. The children sent down there from the metropolitan police courts to reform earned from 8 to 9 cents an hour, out of which they paid \$2.75 a week for board and lodgings. The republic has been recognized by the home office as a certified reformatory.

WIFE OF I. W. W. WANTS DIVORCE

MRS. VIOLA HINES ALLEGES
HUSBAND TOOK HER EARN-
INGS TO PAY HIS DUES TO LA-
BOR UNION

That her husband, Samuel Hines, was a member of the I. W. W. order and an alleged socialist, a fact which she did not know at the time of her marriage, that he took the earnings which she provided for the care of herself and children to pay his dues to that order, and that he abused and mistreated her on all occasions, are among the grounds based by Mrs. Viola S. Hines in her suit for divorce filed yesterday in the circuit court clerk's office.

The complaint recites that the couple were married in 1909, and lived together until the spring of 1911, during which time she "was shamefully abused, and that at the end of that period he deserted her entirely with her two little girls born of a previous marriage.

No property settlement is requested. C. C. Brower is the attorney retained by the plaintiff.

STOCKHOLM AFTER RATS

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 18.—The city authorities have begun a campaign against rats by offering a reward of about 2 1/2 cents for every carcass delivered. While it is hoped thus to reduce the rat plague considerably, the chief end is to secure an important addition to the stock of fats available for the making of soaps and lubricants.

The rat carcasses are treated in a "corpse utilization establishment," where, after the fat has been boiled out, what remains is converted into a poultry food. South Sweden has for some time been utilizing cadavers of various animals in this way. A considerable amount of fat is also secured by skimming large containers placed in the sewers leading from hotels, restaurants and other places where there is an unavoidable waste of fat.

ENGLISH PENSIONS INCREASED

LONDON, Aug. 18.—Old age pensioners who hitherto have received five shillings a week pension will now be paid seven shillings and sixpence, the chancellor of the exchequer has announced.
