Red Cross to Knit 500 Tons of Wool

One million pounds of knitting wool, to be knitted by American women into garments to protect American soldiers and sailors from cold this winter, have been purchased by the Red Cross. This yarn is to be distributed to Red Cross warehouses and sold to the chapters throughout the United States, the proceeds to be turned back into the treasury of the Red Cross and made available for other work. The spinning mills are now engaged in making this yarn. It will furnish material for 1,300,000 sweaters or 2,000,000 pairs woolen socks. It could be turned into 2,000,000 mufflers or 8,000,000 knitted wristlets. These sweaters when completed will be worth at least \$6 each retail, and the other articles are proportionately valuable. This material, when worked into finished shape, will in dollars and cents represent over \$2,000,000 yarn value and \$5,700,000 value in the time and effort of American women.

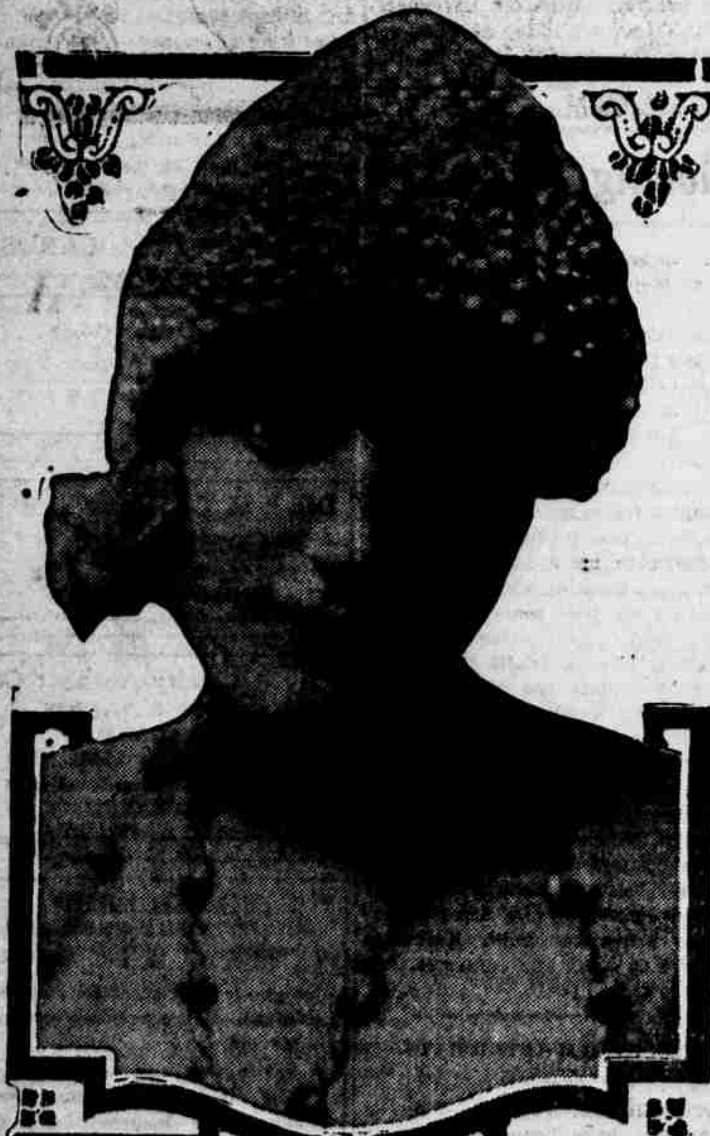
