Sister's School to Be Ready Soon

The sisters' convent so long looked for, and which will be known as the "Klamath Falls Academy," is an assured fact, and everything is on the high road of completion for the opening on September 3rd, on which date all prospective students must be enrolled. Actual teaching, however, will not begin until September 10th. Students who are to board at the academy should forward immediately their names and addresses, so they need not present themselves until September 10th.

The boarding and music departments of the academy will be located in the residence of the sisters, as the new school building will be used for school work only. Quite an encouraging number of students have applied as boarders, and all apprehension of a small patronage has vanished. Both boys and girls will be accepted as boarders, but no boy over 12 years of age will be received as a boarder. Girls and young ladies, regardless of age, will be accepted as boarders.

The domestic features of the academy will be in the hands of the sisters entirely, and every assurance is

given that nothing will be left undone to make that department complete. The academy will be directed by seven Sisters of Charity, who will arrive in Klamath Falls within the next two weeks. These sisters represent the highest type of womanhood, and they will bring to the academy the best talent and ability that a long experience in education can provide. Grades will cover primary, grammar and all branches of the high school. Text books to be used are the same as adopted in the public schools of Oregon. Whilst pupils of every denomination and no denomination will be accepted on presentation of proper credentials as to character and reputation, no pupil will ever be compelled to take part in any religious exercise. Catholic children alone will be required to follow the religious training. Attendance at religious exercises will be purely passive for all non-Catholics, and the religious wishes of parents, non-Catholic, who will have their children at the academy will always be respected. Music and painting will be taught. Boarders will be charged \$30.00 a month, which will include board, tuition and laundry. Day scholars will be charged \$2.50 a month.

NEW BRIDGE IS MONEY MAKER

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 21.—The big steel interstate bridge across the Columbia River between Vancouver, Wash., and Portland, Ore., on the Pacific highway, is a money-maker, according to figures recently compiled by Rufus Holman, Portland, chairman of the bridge commission. The big bridge was completed recently at a cost of \$1,556,321. Mr. Holman says this figure is approximately \$120,000 less than the original estimated cost.

POSTMASTER URGES PATRONS TO HAVE INCOMING MAIL MARKED WITH STREET OR BOX NUMBER

The efficiency of our city free delivery can be much increased if our patrons will co-operate with us in urging your correspondents to place your correct street address or box number on all your incoming mail. No matter how well known you are, this is essential to prompt service. New clerks or carriers—or substitutes—are apt to be used at any time, and letters not fully addressed will be delayed in delivery until the directories can be searched and the address completed. The delay will be your fault if your correspondents are not advised of your full address.

Our service has been in operation nearly a year now, and yet fully three-fourths of all letters arriving are deficient in full address. It is up to our patrons to correct this. Urge all correspondents to give full street address or box number, as the case may be. If your mail comes general delivery, have it so addressed. Where your mail is delivered to your residence, and for illustration, you live at 5th street, and at 100 North of Main street, give your address as "No. . . . North Fifth." This help to your part will add wonderfully to prompt delivery of mail from the office.—W. A. Deibel, P. M.
