

New Red Cross Appointments Made

**Raw Material to Be Supplied Divisional
Depots from Washington. Oregon
Is Transferred from San Fran-
cisco Division to Seattle
Washington**

The war council of the American Red Cross announces the appointment of division directors of the supply service to eleven of the thirteen territorial divisions into which the country has been divided. The men appointed are all successful business executives, and each has volunteered his services to the Red Cross without pay for the duration of the war.

To facilitate the work of the American Red Cross in supplying surgical dressings, hospital garments and other comforts for the American soldier and sailor, supply depots will be located at each divisional headquarters in charge of a divisional director of the supply service.

Raw material purchased in large quantities by the Red Cross supply service in Washington will be distributed to these divisional depots where a three months' supply will be maintained. Here the Red Cross chapters in the division can obtain quickly the raw material which the women workers will convert into such finished products as surgical dressings, sweaters, mufflers, sheets, pillow cases, pajamas and other hospital supplies. These articles and other supplies from the chapters will be sent weekly to the division depots and there inspected, sorted, packed and dispatched to shipping ports for consignment abroad on instructions from national headquarters. Each chapter will be advised of the final disposition of its distributions.

Under the direction of J. Rogers Flannery, associate director of the Red Cross supply service, this department has been reorganized on a war basis to meet the many urgent and enlarged demands made upon it.

The service has been highly systematized in every detail so that the American Red Cross may be in position to supply with the utmost economy and dispatch whatever demands the war may make upon it.

Through Red Cross commissions to the allied nations, the supply service will be kept informed on conditions abroad and information will be supplied to permit of its being prepared as far as possible to meet all demands well in advance of the need.

Irrigated Crops Good; Pastures Drying Up

PORTLAND, Aug. 23.—Irrigated crops in excellent condition, corn doing fairly well and wheat, oats, rye and barley showing poor to fairly good yields, are features reported in the weekly crop summary issued by the weather bureau.

Spring sown wheat is generally poor in quality. Winter wheat is better, but not first class. Some grain is shriveled.

Weather conditions have been ideal for harvesting during the past week. Root crops are reported poor. Pastures and ranges are dried up, and stock is in poor to fair condition. The fruit outlook continues promising.

May Scatter Weed Seed Over Germany

PARIS, Aug. 23.—It might have been thought that nothing new remained to be attempted in aerial warfare, but the French aviation authorities are considering an idea, first suggested by the celebrated pilot, Vedrines, of throwing seeds of that troublesome weed, couch grass (known to farmers as squitch or quitch) over the cultivated land in Germany.

It is asserted that it would be an easy matter for an aeroplane to carry 500 pounds of the seed and let it fall

on fields where corn, beets or potatoes are planted, and that if a supply is not available, scientists would not take long to raise it in sufficient quantity to send a thousand of the aeroplanes which France is expecting from the United States, over Germany's crops.

The possibility of dropping seeds of some rapidly growing form of mushroom fungus, or even germs of phylloxera, is also under consideration.

Trouble In Spain Is Threatening

BARCELONA, Aug. 18, by courier to the French frontier.—Violent rioting has been taking place in Barcelona and the neighboring towns since last Monday, when a general strike was proclaimed. Shooting from roofs of houses and behind closed shutters has been going on daily. A considerable number of persons have been killed, and many have been wounded, but no reliable figures are available.

Artillery was brought into action against some buildings which were strongly held by the rioters, and three houses were destroyed.

While these events are going on in Barcelona and in other Catalan

towns, reports are circulating of great disturbances in other parts of Spain, and of a republic being proclaimed at Bilbao and Saragossa. It is impossible to learn the truth regarding these rumors. All the liberal daily newspapers have been supported by the Catalan leaders, it being confined to discontented workmen. The movement seems certain to fail, because of its lack of organization. There is no indication that it is supported by any part of the army. Order probably will be restored in a few days.

The army reservists of 1914 and 1915 have been recalled to the colors.

Food Preparedness

All who like apple butter stand up! It is a favorite dish for young and old alike, and the right constituency is the point in making it, says today's bulletin from the National Emergency Food Garden Commission of Washington, D. C., which in co-operation with this newspaper will give \$5,000 in cash prizes for the best canned vegetables grown in war gardens.

The right proportion of apples and sweet or sterilized cider must be kept in mind. Take five gallons of cider and boil it down one half, skimming occasionally during boiling. Wash, pare, quarter and core the apples, and use in proportion of two parts apples to one part boiled cider. Boil slowly for four to six hours, stirring often to prevent burning. When the butter is two-thirds done, add about a pound of brown sugar to the gallon, and spice to taste. If the apples are a little over-ripe, add lemon or vinegar to give acid taste. Apple butter should be stored in sterilized receptacles, and the tops sealed or

covered with paraffin paper or cloth. Another method of making apple butter is to make a smooth sauce of the apples before adding to the boiled cider and use in the same proportion as above. This method requires about three hours of cooking after the addition of the apples.

A third method requires no cider. Firm, tart apples are allowed to simmer slowly for a long time until of the right consistency. When nearly done, a pound of brown sugar is added for each gallon, and the butter is spiced to taste.

Labor Shortage for Harvest Is Serious

SALEM, Aug. 23.—The shortage of labor for harvesting the crops of Oregon is from 20 to 30 per cent of the demand, according to a mid-season survey just completed by O. F. Hoff, state labor commissioner. The estimate does not include the demand for help in harvesting the fruit crop.

The commissioner declares the harvest generally is proceeding without serious loss. Says the report: "Aside from the harvest demand there has been a serious labor shortage in almost all lines of industry, but the shortage proved least among the skilled mechanics."

PAPER APPLE BOXES USED THIS YEAR

HOOD RIVER, Aug. 23.—Apples in boxes made of paper will be shipped to the markets of the world this fall, if plans now being made by the Fruit Growers' Exchange are successful. Because of the shortage of the wooden boxes caused by strikes in the Puget Sound mills, negotiations have been opened for the supplying of several carloads of heavy cardboard containers for the apple crop soon to be harvested, according to Frederick W. Buff, manager of the exchange.

The schools are to operate under direction of the federal shipping board, and a complete course in navigation is to be taught free to American youths and men above the age of 19 years.
