**YOUTHFUL OFFICER IS ADMITTED BEST PROVOST SERGEANT EVER LOCATED AT MEDFORD POST—HAS RESPONSIBILITIES**

"The busiest man in the post is Sergeant Don Newberry, who has been appointed provost sergeant," says the Medford Tribune, in a recent article on soldier life. "All teams and conveyances are in charge of the provost sergeant, and all hauling of supplies of all sorts is directed by him. Carloads of lumber or coal, commissary supplies and all traffic of every nature comes under his direction. All trains and boats must be met with the mule teams and trucks, and the supplies checked and hauled to their destination. Carry-alls for the officers and their families are furnished thru him; if you want your box filled or a trunk delivered, or a quarter of beef for the mess, you just call up Sergeant Newberry and he will have it done for you. Already he is acknowledged to be the best provost sergeant who has ever held the place here. A university education, combined with willingness to do things will come to the front, even in the position of a provost sergeant in a fourth rate military post."

Don Newberry is the eldest son of Mrs. Wilbur Jones of this city and a brother of Mrs. Lawrence Mahaffey.

**Market Reports**

The week's operations opened with a string of about 2,400 cattle, 1,750 hogs and 1,700 sheep, all of which were yarded to face a strong to steady market. According to the department in which they were offered.

**CATTLE**

The cattle department included about twenty carloads of varied material, grading from feeders to finished cattle. Top grade offerings were strong to higher in every class, cows extending upward to \$7.50 as a top and steers to \$6.75 as a top. The poorer grade, however, in different classes, suffered a decline of 25c to 40c. Stock cattle continued firm, but trading in this department was somewhat slow. With cattle quotations as follows: Best beef steers, \$8.25 to \$8.75; good beef steers \$7.25 to \$8.25; best beef cows, \$6.25 to \$7.25; ordinary to good cows, \$4 to \$6; best heifers, \$6.50 to \$7.50; bulls, \$4.50 to \$6; calves, \$8 to \$9.50; stockers and feeder steers, \$4.50 to \$7.

**HOGS**

The movement of business in the hog alleys was prompt and the buyers keen for properly finished offerings. The advance was from \$1.25 to \$1.50 over the opening of last week's market. No hogs were sold for less than 18c, which was the price of the bulk. The select load sold for \$18.25, which was the top. The number of stock and feeder hogs was larger than that of the previous week, and the price offered was advanced to \$1 and \$1.50, at which price there was a keen demand. The following quotations were taken from the day's business: Prime light hogs, \$18.10 to \$18.25; prime heavy hogs, \$17.95 to \$18.10; pigs, \$16.50 to \$17; bulk of sales, \$18.

**SHEEP**

There was a large volume of business transacted in the sheep house, but no changes of quotations was warranted from the price paid. Business continued at previous quotations which follow: Western lambs, \$12 to \$12.75; valley lambs, \$11.50 to \$12; yearlings, \$9.50 to \$10.25; wethers, \$9.25 to \$10; ewes, \$8 to \$8.50.

**Enlarged Homesteads May Be Soon Available**

**\$100,000 Dollars Recently Appropriated By Congress for Land Classification. 60,000 Applications Have Been Received**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 24.—The department of the interior expects, before the end of the present summer season, to complete the examination of most of the lands applied for under the grazing homestead act, which allows 640 acres to be taken.

About 60,000 applications have been received at the Western land offices, a large number of which, it has been found, are not in proper form, and will be rejected. The commissioner of the general land office forwards the applications to the geological survey, which does the actual work of examining and classifying the lands. About 25,000 applications had been sent over to the geological survey at the end of July.

As the grazing homestead law was enacted last December, there has been much complaint over the delay, but this has not been the fault of the department. No funds were available until congress made an appropriation. The appropriation was carried in the sundry civil service bill, which was

one of the bills blocked in the jam at the last session of congress. It was finally passed at the extra session, and the \$100,000 provided became available in June.

Meanwhile some of the sheep and cattle men, who were unfriendly to the legislation, started an agitation to suspend operation of the law until after the war with Germany is over. Reports also came in that dummy entries were being made for the purpose of harassing stockmen, so that the latter would buy out the entrymen.

In some parts of the West, notably in New Mexico, it is said that a large number of prospective settlers moved onto or near the land which they had selected, believing they could secure action on their applications within a few weeks, and have been about starved out waiting for a chance to get the land. This is a repetition, on a small scale, of what has happened every time there has been a Western land opening.

In this case, the land to be designated must be found to be of such char-

acter as to be best suited for grazing, and not susceptible of irrigation from any known source of supply. Evidently there are many thousands of people ready to take a chance on that sort of an opportunity if allowed to take 640 acres.

While the sum set aside for classification is far from adequate to complete the job, and congress will be asked for more money, the announcement of Secretary Lane that a majority of the applications filed before July 1 of the present year will be acted on within a few months, will be good news to those who have been discouraged by the necessary delay.

**BASTARDLY ATTEMPT TO POISON U. S. SOLDIERS**

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 24.—A conspiracy of tobacco gathered by some unknown agency in Los Angeles and sent to Allentown, Pa., to the soldiers in encampment there, has been found to be saturated with poison. Federal secret service men are reported to be combing the city in an effort to uncover the plot back of the poison tobacco.

The tobacco was sent only a short time ago under the guise of a generous gift to the men in training. Word has been sent to war relief organizations here to examine all donations, and if the slightest suspicion attaches to refuse to accept them and notify the federal authorities.
