Hints for Homemaker's

(I will endeavor to print recipes that have proven to be successful in this altitude, and hope that my readers will assist me by sending to me some of the recipes they have used.)

Home-Made Baking Powder.

Sift together six times one-half pound pulverized cream of tartar, one-quarter pound soda (bi-carbonate of sodium) and one-quarter pound corn-starch.

Corn Relish.

Shave the corn from the cobs of two dozen ears sweet corn. Chop or slice finely one cabbage (large), three onions, two green peppers; add one tablespoonful celery seed, one and one-half cupsful brown sugar, one tablespoonful ground mustard, three pints cider vinegar, one tablespoonful salt. Cook all together for about half an hour and seal in glass jars.

Home-Made Soap.

One cup potash, one quart cold water, 20 cents worth glycerine, three tablespoons borax, one cup almond meal, one ounce bergamot, six pounds grease (clear). Put potash in cold water, add glycerine, borax meal and oil after it is dissolved, and cool. Let the grease be strained and just melted, not hot. Stir grease into the mixture. Stir until it looks like cream. Pour into pan, or, better yet, into corset boxes lined with greased paper. Cut into squares before quite hard.

Huckleberry Cottage Pudding.

Rub one-quarter cup butter with two cups sugar, add three well beaten eggs and beat until light. Sift two cups flour with two teaspoonfuls baking powder, one-quarter teaspoonful salt and one-half teaspoonful grated nutmeg, and add to first mixture alternately with one cup of sweet milk. Add one quart huckleberries, well coated with flour. Bake half hour and serve with cream.

Apple Cream Pie.

Make a rich flaky piecrust, cut up two sour apples, mix four tablespoons sugar, a little cinnamon and four small pieces of butter; put in the oven and bake. Make a cream filling as follows: Yolks of two eggs, cup of milk, tablespoon of cornstarch and three tablespoonfuls sugar. Cook in double boiler, flavor with vanilla. Add half cup cream and pour over apples. Beat white of two eggs and two tablespoonfuls of confectionary sugar for frosting. Bake till light brown.

Rice With Cheese.

Steam or boil one cupful rice with one tablespoon salt; cover bottom of buttered pudding dish with rice, dot over with three-quarter tablespoon of butter, sprinkle with thin shavings of mild cheese and a few grains cayenne, repeat until rice and quarter pound of cheese are used. Add milk half the depth of contents of dish, cover with buttered cracker crumbs and bake until cheese melts.

Baked Dried Peas.

One pint dried green peas, quarter pound salt pork, small onion, teaspoonful salt, quarter teaspoonful of sugar. Bake peas over night and rinse well in morning. Bake same as beans.

Beef Loaf With Green Peppers.

Chop together two pounds of the bottom of the round steak and quarter pound of bacon; add cupful bread crumbs, two well beaten eggs, teaspoonful salt and one chopped green pepper previously soaked in cold water for one hour. Mix thoroughly; add the pulp from one can of tomatoes, pack in mound in the center of a baking dish, pour the tomato juice around it, and bake for three-quarters of an hour. If desired the tomatoes may be left out, putting half cup of water in baking dish instead, and adding more if necessary.

A Use for Stale Bread.

Dry or slightly toast stale pieces of bread on the back of the stove or in a slow oven. Crush with a rolling pin and serve as a breakfast food with cream and sugar and fruit if desired. It closely resembles a commercial breakfast food.

Pie Plant—Some New Ways.

Fresh pie-plant skinned and cut into inch long pieces, then measure. To one quart of pie-plant allow three cups of sugar, three oranges, half a teaspoonful of mace, a dozen cloves and a small bit of cinnamon. Chop the oranges, being careful to remove the inner skin and seeds, and add to the mixture. If the oranges are dry, add

two tablespoonfuls of water. Cover the dish closely and set in a hot oven and bake until the pie-plant is clear. Shortcake baked double with the touching sides buttered, separated when cooked and cooked pie-plant placed between is excellent. It should be served with a rich sauce.

Lemon Ice.

Three cups sugar, six lemons, three pints water, whites two eggs. Boil the sugar and water together ten minutes. Add the juice of the lemons, strain and cool. When partly cool add the beaten whites of the eggs.

Cabbage Salad.

One quart of chopped cabbage, one dessertspoon of salt, one and a half dessertspoons of sugar, one dessertspoon dry mustard. Mix these with the cabbage, then take two-thirds cup of vinegar, two eggs, piece of butter size of an egg, put in a bowl over the teakettle till boiling hot; cool, and pour over the cabbage mixture. Put in a jar and use as wanted.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Klamath.

In the Matter of the Organization of Pine Grove Irrigation District.
Whereas, under the provisions of chapter 357, General Laws of Oregon for 1917, said County Court, on the 2d day of August, 1917, made and entered an order designating and establishing Pine Grove Irrigation District, with the following boundaries, to-wit:

Beginning at the northwest corner of the NE 1/4 of the NE 1/4, section 7, township 39 south, range 10, E. W. M.; thence due east to the northeast corner of NE 1/4 of NW 1/4, section 8, same township and range; thence south to center of said section 8; thence east to northeast corner of NW 1/4 of SE 1/4, same section; thence south to center of the SE 1/4 of said section 8; thence east to northeast corner of SE 1/4 of SW 1/4 of section 9, said township and range; thence south to southeast corner of SW 1/4 of section 9; thence east to the northeast corner of NW 1/4 of the NE 1/4, section 16, said township and range; thence south to a point intersecting the right of way of the United States Reclamation Service Main and East Branch Canal at the southeast corner of the SW 1/4 of the SE 1/4, in said section 16, same township and range; thence along the northerly limit of said right of way, in a westerly direction to a point where said right of way intersects the section line between sections 17 and 20, in said township and range; thence west to the southwest corner of the SW 1/4 of said section 17; thence north to the southwest corner of the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4, said section 17, same township and range; thence east to the southwest corner of NE 1/4 of NE 1/4, section 18, said township and range; thence north to place of beginning; all in Klamath County, Oregon.

Now, therefore, for the purpose of determining whether or not such district shall be organized under the provisions of said act, an election will be held at Pine Grove school house, in said district, in said county and state, on the 4th day of September, 1917, which election will be held at eight o'clock in the morning, and will continue until seven in the evening of said day, at which the qualified electors therein shall cast ballots which shall contain these words:

IRRIGATION DISTRICT—YES

IRRIGATION DISTRICT—NO

Or words equivalent thereto.
There shall also be elected at such time and place three directors for said district, whose term of office shall expire in one, two and three years, respectively, from the first Tuesday in February, next succeeding their election. The nominations of candidates for said offices may be made by petition, signed by at least ten of the electors in said proposed district, qualified to vote for the officers so nominated, or at an assembly of not less than twenty-five of said electors, which said nominations, by petition or by assembly, shall be filed with the undersigned at least ten days next preceding the date of said election.
