KLAMATH PEOPLE GATHER BERRIES

LARGE CROWD FROM THIS DISTRICT IS NOW AT LAKE OF THE WOODS—HUNDRED GALLONS OF BERRIES PER DAY

One hundred and thirty-five campers, all but five of whom are from Klamath Falls and Klamath County, are now preparing for winter by gathering huckleberries at the Lake of the Woods.

W. A. Delsell, who has just returned from that point, having taken his family up for a few days, declares that strange sights greet the eye, as the men, women and children, all in overalls, return to camp at the close of day with lard cans, pails, tubs and every conceivable form of receptacle filled with this delicious fruit.

It is estimated that over a hundred gallons of these berries are picked each day, and while the grounds near the camps are getting pretty well

picked over, there are still great supplies in the country surrounding. This is one of the best seasons for the berries for several years, according to report.

Lindsay Simons, a prominent stockman of the Fort Klamath section, arrived this morning for a brief visit before leaving for Portland next week. He reports that nearly all the hay in the Wood River Valley is now in the barns or stacks, and that a good crop was cut.

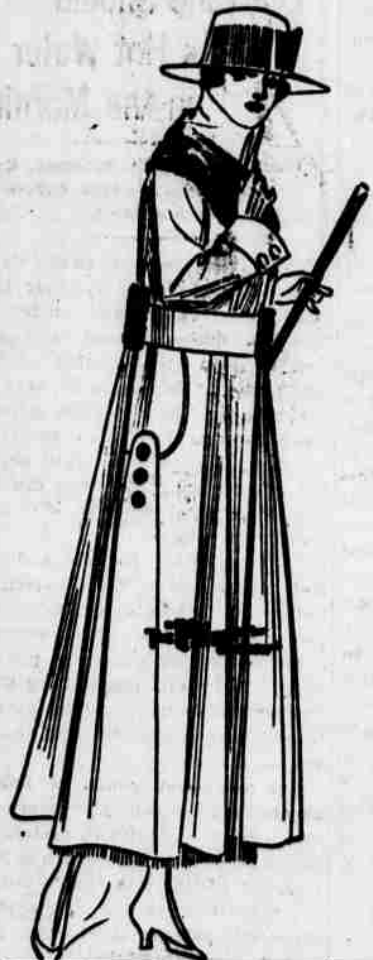
