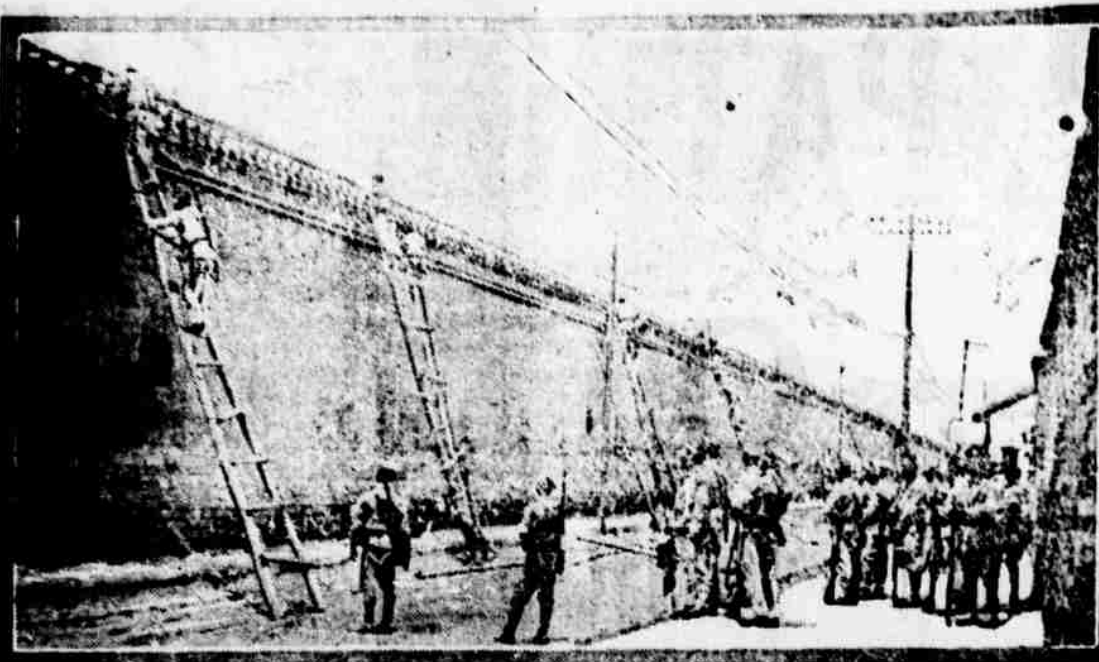

Chinese Soldiers Climb Wall of
Imperial City After General Chang

With little concern for their own safety the republican troops of China, who besieged General Chang Hsun in the imperial city of Peking, after he had restored the young emperor to the throne, climbed the wall in the face of the fire of the royal troops. General Chang's troops were within fifty yards inside the wall ready to fire, but that did not deter the republican forces, who quickly overthrew him.

Admits Better Treatment
Of Teuton Prisoners

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(Correspondence)—Admission that the treatment of German war prisoners in Great Britain was superior to the treatment received in any other country was made by the chief German delegate to the recent conference of British and Germans on war prisoners, according to a statement made by Baron Newton, one of the British delegates, in the house of commons. Virtually no complaint was made of the British methods of dealing with war prisoners, Lord Newton added. One impression he derived from his intercourse with the delegates was that in spite of the German powers of centralization, Berlin headquarters did not know a great deal of what went on. That impression, he said, more or less confirmed what James W. Gerard, the late American ambassador at Berlin, used to tell him, that there was less centralization than was supposed, and that the control at Berlin over prisoners of war was nothing like so effective as in this country. He had a strong suspicion that a great deal went on in various German camps of which the central German administration knew little. As they had twenty times as many prisoners as the British had, it would be surprising, he said, if they did not know all that went on.

No Further Draft
Calls Before Spring

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 25.—A full statistical report on the operations of the draft law will be prepared by the provost marshal general's office as soon as the mobilization of the first increment of 687,000 men of the national army has been completed some time early in October.

Pending the preparation of the report, no steps toward calling a second increment to the colors will be taken. General Crowder said recently that the call for the second increment never had been considered at any conference at which he was present, and that he had no indication that it had been taken up in any way by President Wilson or Secretary Baker.

The first increment will fill all the training areas—sixteen national guard camps and sixteen national army cantonments—to capacity, and there will be a surplus of men beside those assigned to the regular army. The war strength by voluntary enlist-

DIVORCE SUIT FILED

Mrs. Dorothy Mae Jacobs, in a divorce action filed yesterday with Circuit Court Clerk George Chastain, asks separation from her husband, Lester Leo Jacobs, and the return of her maiden name, Dorothy Mae Colburn.

The complaint recites that the couple were married in Alturas, Calif., in 1915, and that since that date she has experienced only brutal treatment at the hands of the defendant. Frequent threats to shoot her have been made, it is declared, and she has been subjected to shameful abuse in the presence of others.

CRUDE OIL IS NOW THE
NATION'S GREATEST NEED

Next to food and munitions, crude oil is of more importance to the nation than anything else, not excepting soldiers and sailors. Soldiers and sailors cannot be equipped or placed on the battle front without fuel and transportation—without oil.

Gasoline horsepower built and sold in 1913 was 11,300,000. In 1916 it was double that figure. In 1910 we had 400,000 motor cars in use. In 1916 we had 2,350,000.

The additional cars required 25,000,000 barrels of gasoline a year, and today automobiles are demanding

10,000,000 to 50,000,000 barrels. Besides, there are a million motor boats. Railroads in 1916 consumed 42,000,000 barrels of fuel oil and demand much more this year, while the government refuses to allow them to develop crude oil on their own lands. The progress of the army today depends on automobiles and trucks to carry food and munitions, gasoline to propel and oil to lubricate.

FILM STAR MUST
GO TO FRONT

FILES CLAIM OF EXEMPTION ON GROUNDS OF DEFENDENTS, BUT IT DEVELOPS WIFE IS SELF SUPPORTING.

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—Bryant Washburn, a widely known motion picture actor, must serve in the national army, Major B. M. Chipperfield, representing the provost marshal general ruled today.

Washburn, who has passed the physical examination, claimed exemption on the ground that he had a wife and child dependent upon him. Service agents learned, Major Chipperfield said, that Washburn had a bank account of \$5,500, and that his wife, who was Mabel Forrest, an actress, had appeared in pictures before and after the birth of their child.

Mrs. Washburn, according to the major, had been offered a contract to appear in pictures, but declined to enter negotiations until her husband's case was settled.
