

Food Preparedness

Inquiries are coming in from all over the country to the National Emergency Food Garden Commission of Washington which is co-operating with the Evening Herald in a nation wide drive to can and dry the produce of war gardens. The commission, in co-operation with this paper, will give \$5,000 in prizes for the best canned vegetables grown in war gardens, and all war garden committees and any others in charge of canning exhibitions should write to P. S. Rigdale, the secretary, of 210 Maryland building, for further information as to the awards.

Here are some suggestions to those who will exhibit their canned vegetables:

Tomatoes—Select fruits of uniform size and color, peel carefully and pack in layers, stem side down, so the tomatoes are in rows from bottom to top of the can. They may also be placed so that one layer breaks joints with the next above and below.

Peas—Sort the peas so they will be of the same size and color, and sterilize carefully, so the can will be full of liquid. Do not overcook or have

split peas in the can, or the liquor will be milky.

Corn—Use well filled ears of light color, with kernels of uniform size in just prime condition for table use. Blanch five minutes, cold dip and cut the kernels rather close up to the cob. By cutting carefully parts of rows will stick together and may be placed in circular rows or rings around the can. If sterilizing in steam a low pressure will be likely to give a lighter color than a high pressure. One pound pressure for two hours is ideal.

Beets—Select small beets of same size, shape and color, peel carefully and arrange in layers in the jar. The process of sterilizing will take out some of the color, but will return if the jars are kept from the light.

Carrots—Carrots of same shape, size and color make an attractive exhibit. After they are blanched, cold dipped and peeled, pack lengthwise from bottom to top and alternate so that every other one has the top in the same direction.

Lima Beans—These should also be selected so as to be of same size and color. Two or three layers may be placed flat side out and then several layers with edge out.

Drafted Men May Be Commissioned

Instructions For Procedure In Such Cases Are Received By Local Board From Adjutant General George A. White

To All Local Exemption Boards: The following telegram received from the provost marshal general is repeated herewith for your information and guidance:

"Under paragraph D of section 18 of the rules and regulations for local and district boards, no person can be exempted on the ground that he is in the military service of the United States if he has not been enlisted, appointed or engaged in such service prior to the date on which he was called by a local board. There is no reason, however, why a drafted man cannot be commissioned as an officer in the military service of the United States or engaged as an army field clerk quite as well from his status as a drafted man as from his status as a civilian. In case a registrant is called by a local board while his appointment as an officer or as a field clerk is pending he should report to his local board and submit to induction into the service in the regular manner as a drafted man. After all claims

for exemption or discharge by or in respect of him are decided, and after the time for filing such claims has expired, he may be appointed or commissioned from his status as a selected man and ordered by competent military authority to report for duty to some place other than a mobilization camp. In such case he should send three copies of the order directing him to report for duty at some place other than a mobilization camp to his local board. Upon receipt of these copies, the local board should retain one copy, should send one to the mobilization camp with the proper contingent of men, and should send the other to the mobilization camp by registered mail as provided in section 15, mobilization regulations. Upon receipt of these orders at the mobilization camp, the local board will receive credit on its next quota for one drafted man."

Volunteers In Army Total Nearly Million

There are today 943,141 men in the armed forces of the United States, all volunteers.

Since the declaration of war, approximately 1,300,000 men have offered themselves for service in the fighting forces of the country. During the time this country has been a belligerent 121,514 men have been volunteered for service in the navy and marine corps, and been accepted. In the regular army the increase since April 1st by volunteer enlistment has been 190,247, and in the national guard 126,922, a total of 227,945 enlistments in the army

branches, and a grand total of 448,859 in both army and navy.

Even this figure does not include all who have been accepted for service since the United States entered the war, for there have been additions to the various reserve corps, but these figures are not all available. The largest single item is that of the 27,341 men recently commissioned from the officers' training camps.

These figures were gathered from the most recent official returns of the army and navy, which are available, but especially in the case of the army figures, accuracy down to the last unit is not possible.

COAST LEAGUE MAY BE REARRANGED

PORTLAND, Aug. 25.—A plan for reorganization of Western baseball territory next year in case the war continues, was broached here this week by Henry Berry, manager of the San Francisco club of the Pacific Coast League. Mr. Berry says it will not be practicable to continue next year as at present, as all teams are losing heavily. His plan calls for three leagues,

each of Class A. One, he thinks should include Portland, Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane; another Salt Lake and the Montana towns, and the third San Francisco, Los Angeles, Oakland and probably San Diego. His idea is that the rearrangement would be only for the period of the war, after which the present arrangement could be resumed. He will take up the project at the next meeting on the Coast League, he said.
