Big Increase Over Last Year's Crops

Corn, Barley and Potatoes Promise the Best Showing at This Time. Hay and Cotton Are the Only Commodities Which Will Yield Less Than in 1916

The estimated crop reports for the year 1917, issued by the Continental and Commercial National bank of Chicago, shows marked increase on all the staple products of the country over last year, with the exception of tame hay and cotton, which will fall slightly under the yield of 1916.

Prisoners At Walla Walla Again Quiet

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 27.—The mutiny among the prisoners of the Washington state penitentiary has ended because the sixty or more men implicated became so tired and weakened from the lack of food and water they were forced to stop beating upon their cell walls and doors with Oregon boots and iron buckets and listen to reason. A committee of prisoners presented Warden Drum with a written communication, making six demands, as follows:

"First—We demand the immediate removal of J. T. Burke, captain of the guards.

"Second—We demand the immediate removal of M. A. Power, warden's secretary.

"Third—We demand the immediate removal from solitary confinement of all prisoners who have been held in solitary for more than twenty days.

"Fourth—We desire the recreation yard for short periods every day for the inmates who work in the jute mill and while the jute mill is idle, we demand a morning and afternoon session in the recreation yard.

"Fifth—We insist upon sanitary cooking utensils and sanitary dishes for our daily food.

"Sixth—We desire a fair, impartial trial before the warden for any infraction of prison rules, before any punishment is inflicted upon us."

Warden Drum made immediate reply, refusing to discharge Captain Burke and Clerk Power, but agreeing that the inmates might be given more recreation out of working hours in order to obtain more outdoor air.

He made no immediate concessions regarding more sanitary cooking utensils and dishes, these being extra good, according to report; but agreed to give more personal attention to in-

vestigation and hearing of cases wherein it is charged a convict has violated the rules.

UNCLE SAM TO ASSIST CANADA

WILL CO-OPERATE IN THE HARVESTING OF CROPS BY SHIPPING HANDS FROM THIS COUNTRY—LOW RATES EXPECTED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 27.—Under a working arrangement between this country and Canada, whereby the labor situation in either will be fully met. W. W. Cory, deputy minister of the interior for Canada has spent some time at the department of labor in conference with Immigration Commissioner A. Caminetti, arranging for men to be sent to Canada to assist in harvesting the crops. By way of inducement, Canada offers a railroad rate of one cent a mile for travel both ways.

Speaking of the matter Mr. Caminetti said:

"It happens now that there is a moving army of workers that started in Oklahoma, that went thru Kansas, Iowa, part of Missouri, South Dakota, and is now going into North Dakota and Nebraska. Then they will take in Minnesota and Wisconsin as the crops ripen. As they approach the Canadian border and reach the time when the crops on the other side of the line are ready, they will, under our reciprocal arrangement with Canada, cross over and help conserve and protect them. Under the agreements men who cross the boundary to work in the wheat fields of Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta will be given coupon tickets which will entitle them to a one-cent railway fare. While in the western provinces of Canada and on return they will not be required to secure the usual "permit to leave Canada."

WHEAT TO EXCEED TWO DOLLAR MARK

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 27.—The price paid by the food administration for the portion it buys of the 1917 wheat crop will probably exceed \$2 a bushel. The committee, which will recommend a price, will submit its report early this week.

In recommending a price, the committee plans to consider that the producer must receive enough to stimu-

late production next year and at the same time will consider carefully war conditions and the rights of the consumer.

The food administration's hope is that the government price will obtain in private transactions, and it is ready to buy up the entire crop for distribution if prices cannot be established.
