

American Red Cross Plans For Christmas

The American Red Cross, with its 3,000,000 members, has just completed plans for the Christmas cheer of every soldier and sailor in the national service. Many of the men who will be in the cantonments and the trenches this year will be spending their first Christmas away from home. None will be forgotten.

Red Cross Chapters nearest the thirty-two army cantonments and camps will probably arrange in their towns community Christmas trees, with carols, pageants and holiday movies to which the 600,000 men in training will be invited.

Arrangements of the details of the Christmas celebration for our men in France is being made, but the Red Cross will see to it that every soldier has his Christmas package with its message of good will from the women on the home side of the Atlantic. There will be surprises in every package, but all of them are likely to contain writing paper, pipes, tobacco, cigars and cigarettes, unbreakable mirrors, puzzles, dominoes, handkerchiefs and playing cards.

Many of the chapters are already at work finishing their Christmas allotments of comfort bags. Most of them are made of khaki and are furnished with extra pairs of woolen socks, housewives with needles, pins, thread and buttons. Detailed suggestions of how to wrap these Christmas packages for shipping will be issued by the Red Cross. The Red Cross will also welcome the co-operation of anyone desiring to have a part in sending Christmas cheer to the men in training or at the front. Some people will want to give money to buy articles, bags, mouth organs, envelopes and paper, safety razors, extra soap, spoons and knives. Some will want to have a personal part in tying up the packages. Children will be asked to help with the package making.

The gifts will be bought from contributions especially given for the Christmas greeting. The Red Cross war fund will not be used for this purpose.

Last year the American Red Cross sent presents of various kinds to the men on the Mexican border and the

marines at Haiti and San Domingo. The articles were suggested by General Pershing on the request of Red Cross officials. Commenting on the Red Cross Christmas gifts to the soldiers, he said:

"These things bring the soldier to remember that the people at home are behind him. You do not know how much that is going to mean to us who are abroad. You do not know how much that means to any soldier who is over here carrying the flag for his country."

S. P. COMPANY STILL PROSPEROUS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—With \$16,988,495 of railway operating revenues for July, as reported from the offices of William Sprule and Julius Kruttschnitt, the Southern Pacific road is continuing to earn at the rate of \$189,999,999 for the 1917 period. In other words, the company's revenues are at the rate of about 20 per cent on the stock.

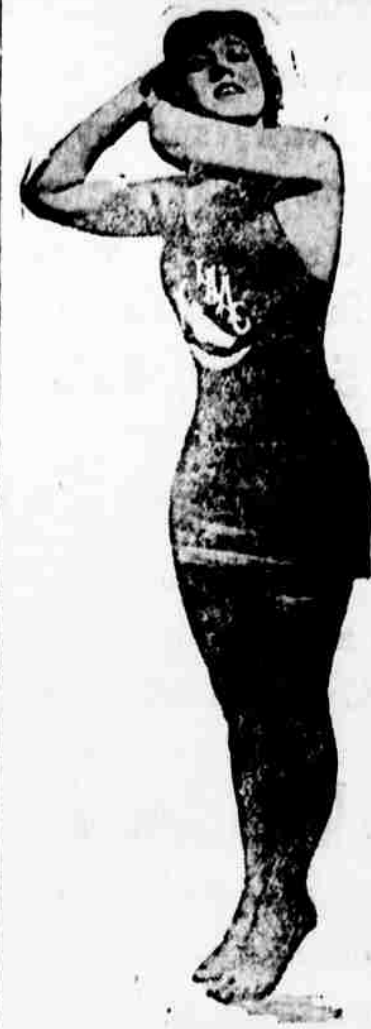
July's operating revenues increased \$839,618 over the same month of last year. Railway operating revenues for the first seven months of this year reached high water mark for such a period, in the sum of \$1,071,564,441, an increase of \$29,303,749 over the same period of 1916.

Railway operating expenses for July and the seven months were, respectively \$9,491,459 and \$67,165,465, or increases of \$887,632 and \$9,980,599.

Allies Losses Are Less Than Supposed

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 27.—That the risk of the fighting man is not nearly so great as is popularly imagined is the belief of marine corps officials here who have compiled statistics covering the allied losses in the war.

A careful estimate shows that only one man in fifteen is killed, and one out of 500 loses a limb. Recent reports from French and British hospitals show that about 95 per cent recover from wounds, while about 90 per cent are able to return to the firing line.

While the marine corps officials hold unbiased views in regard to the expected casualties among their own troops in France, it is pointed out that the "soldiers of the sea" recently engaged in warfare in Haiti, suffered less than 1 per cent losses. These were sustained while covering a wide terrain, fighting from house to house, and capturing and holding small re-

doubts, taken one by one from the enemy. This method of warfare is said to be rapidly superseding the trench system of the western front.

Uniforms They Wear In the Marine Corps



If you join the marine corps—the soldiers of the United States who are always first in war—you will wear one uniform for dress parade and on warships and another for action. That at the left of the photograph shows the uniform, while the one at the right shows the uniform for action.

The first uniform is of blue. The coat is of navy blue, while the trousers are of sky blue. The second uniform is similar to that of the infantry in the field. It is made of khaki. On the dress uniform the chevrons are yellow like those of the cavalry, the trimmings red like the artillery, and the caps suggest the navy.



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
