Draft Quota Leaving Sept. 5th, Reduced

Only Five Per Cent Will Leave on This Date Instead of Thirty As Originally Announced. Exemption Boards Are Praised

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28.—Provost Marshal General Crowder sent to governors of states an order changing the proportion of the various states' quota of men selected for the national army that are required to be furnished on certain dates.

The new order calls for 5 per cent of each state's quota to report at cantonments September 5th, 40 percent on September 19th, 40 percent on October 3d, and the remaining 15 per cent as soon thereafter as practicable. Reasons for the change were given by General Crowder as follows:

In announcing the decision to mobilize only 5 per cent of the national army on September 5th, instead of 30 percent, the opportunity is taken to give to local and district boards the credit that is due them for the overwhelming amount of work they have accomplished in scrutinizing the thousands of cases that it was necessary for them to examine in order to have 30 percent of their quota ready on September 5th.

Reports received from practically every state in the Union show that every state would have ready much more than 30 per cent of its quota on September 5th, and the vast majority of them would have been ready with the entire quota on that date. This service has required a month of the most exacting work on the part of the boards. This work was consummated

under adverse conditions, and is in large part uncompensated.

It stands as one of the most significant impressions of substantial patriotism and devotion on the part of 15,000 men selected from among the best citizens of the country.

W. O. W. INITIATE TOMORROW NIGHT

The Woodmen of the World will introduce the first installment of a class of twenty-five men in an initiation ceremony at west hall in Odd Fellows building tomorrow evening. It is announced that the new ritual will be used for the first time after three weeks spent in hard drill. Refreshments will be served at the close of the ceremony.

DON ZUMWALT AT KIRK

Don Zumwalt, who has finished the surveying work on the logging road for the Algoma Lumber company near Algoma, has left for Kirk, where he will start work of a similar nature on a road for the same company. He expects to remain away for some time.

REMANDED TO JAIL

Unable to secure bonds satisfactory to Justice of the Peace E. W. Gowan, E. A. Quail, proprietor of the Hot Springs rooming house, who was last week convicted of "bootlegging" before E. W. Gowan, has been remanded to the county jail.

Quail, on his conviction before the justice court, gave notice of appeal, and was placed under \$750 bonds. He was fined \$400 and costs and given thirty days in jail, following his conviction in the justice court.
