Soldiers Will Not Fight Forest Fires

No soldiers will be sent to fight forest fires in the state of Oregon.

Adjutant General White positively vetoed the suggestion of State Fire Warden Elliott that the enlisted men be sent to fight fires, and it is believed the government will back him up. "The demand that the federal troops be sent to fight forest fires is preposterous," declared Adjutant General White. "I am surprised that any officer of the state of Oregon would even think of it. We must remember that this country is at war, and the business of a soldier is to war on the enemy, and not to take the place of civilians in fighting fire. "We have dispatched a number of troops for patrol duty to shoot incendiaries because they are trained to shoot and to obey orders, but we are not going to take men from the intensive training they are getting now for their coming duty in France to send out into places which the civilian has always filled and should fill now." The men selected for the incendiary hunt left Saturday. Extra supplies of gasoline were ordered hurried out for the motorcycle men who were among those ordered out, and subsistence supplies have also been dispatched to the various points from which the troops will work. Every foot of Oregon timber will be under surveillance. Reports received by local fire patrol officials show that no further fires have been started about the state, and with the fire fighters on hand it will be possible to soon control the flames.

Confidence Renewed By New Russian Loan

LONDON, Aug. 28.—Press cables from Washington, stating that the United States is making an additional loan of \$100,000,000 to Russia aroused much optimistic opinion both in and out of official circles as to the real situation in the new republic. The belief was widely expressed that the United States government, with its far reaching sources of information, would not thus increase her loans to Russia to the great sum of \$275,000,000 unless there were assurances that the world's newest republic will be able to weather successfully the storms.

CAPITAL MAY BE CHANGED IN RUSSIA BEFORE LONG

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28.—The Russian provisional government has decided to abandon Petrograd as the capital of Russia, according to reports received here. It was said that the action was brought about by German influences in the capital, reinforced by the operations of the German army in the north. At the same time advice received here contained suggestions of a series of plots to overthrow the Kerensky government. Based on one contingency, it was the view of the state department that Moscow will be made the permanent seat of the Russian government. The contingency is the reaching of an agreement at the conference, convened in Russia, to prosecute the war vigorously and eliminate all talk of a separate peace.

PHOENIX COMMON SIGHT IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Aug. 28.—The sight of a brilliantly plumed Chinese cock pheasant strutting about on a well kept lawn is not an unusual sight in the suburban home districts of Portland. These birds are said to show a marked partiality for dwellings near the habitation of man. Many broods of various kinds of game birds, notably the Chinese pheasant, are hatched almost in the back yards of the suburbanites.
