

# Riga Drive Is Believed Ended

PETROGRAD, Aug. 29.—The new German offensive on the Riga front has been brought to an end without attaining any important success, according to a statement issued by official government press bureau. Details of the fighting which followed the opening of the German thrust in the Riga sector about August 15th are given in the report as follows:

For several days the Riga front has been the scene of activity. In the direction of the Baltic Sea the Russian troops evacuated territory, falling back several kilometers in the direction of Schlock. The Germans, observing the retirement, set out in pursuit in an effort to cut off the roads, but were forced back by artillery and machine gun fire.

At present the Russians occupy an excellent defensive line.

On August 19-20 the Germans attempted another offensive against the Russian outposts in the region close to the coast. Everywhere the German attacks were repulsed by the brilliant fire of the Russian artillery. In the region of Kekku an attempt was made by the Germans to break the Russian advance line, but they were again flung back in disorder,

suffering heavy losses under the fire of the Russian artillery.

On August 18 the Germans began bombarding in the region southwest of Lago Habit, the cannonage lasting four hours.

Having destroyed part of the Russian trenches, the Germans attacked in column formation, but were dispersed by the Russian gunfire.

German artillery became active in the region of Olay, on the night of August 20, more than 1,000 shells being fired.

Taking into account all of the facts in regard to the fighting on the Riga front, one can say that the German offensive has ended, and has been without any important success.

German prisoners declared that the German artillery preparations came to an end on August 17, and that August 20 was the date set for the offensive operations by the infantry.

The indecision shown by the German command as well as the inactivity of the Baltic fleet merit attention. In all the preceding offensives the fleet had co-operated with the land force.

In full accord with the general staff the central military Polish commission has arranged secretly for the formation of Polish military units, composed of volunteer officers and soldiers of all arms of the service.

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# Hawaiians Are Trained On Historic Field

HONOLULU, T. H., Aug. 29.—Upon an ancient Hawaiian training field, where warriors of the centuries ago were developed for hand to hand fighting, the United States army has opened a training camp for officers on the plains of Lellehua, twenty miles from Honolulu, on the military reservation where now are established 8,000 United States soldiers in Schofield Barracks. The camp was opened August 27th, with 101 applicants for officers' commissions, 100 of whom will be regularly designated, and the odd man is Brigadier Samuel Ivan Johnson, who commands the National Guard of four regiments, but who is anxious to obtain extra training as a mere rookie.

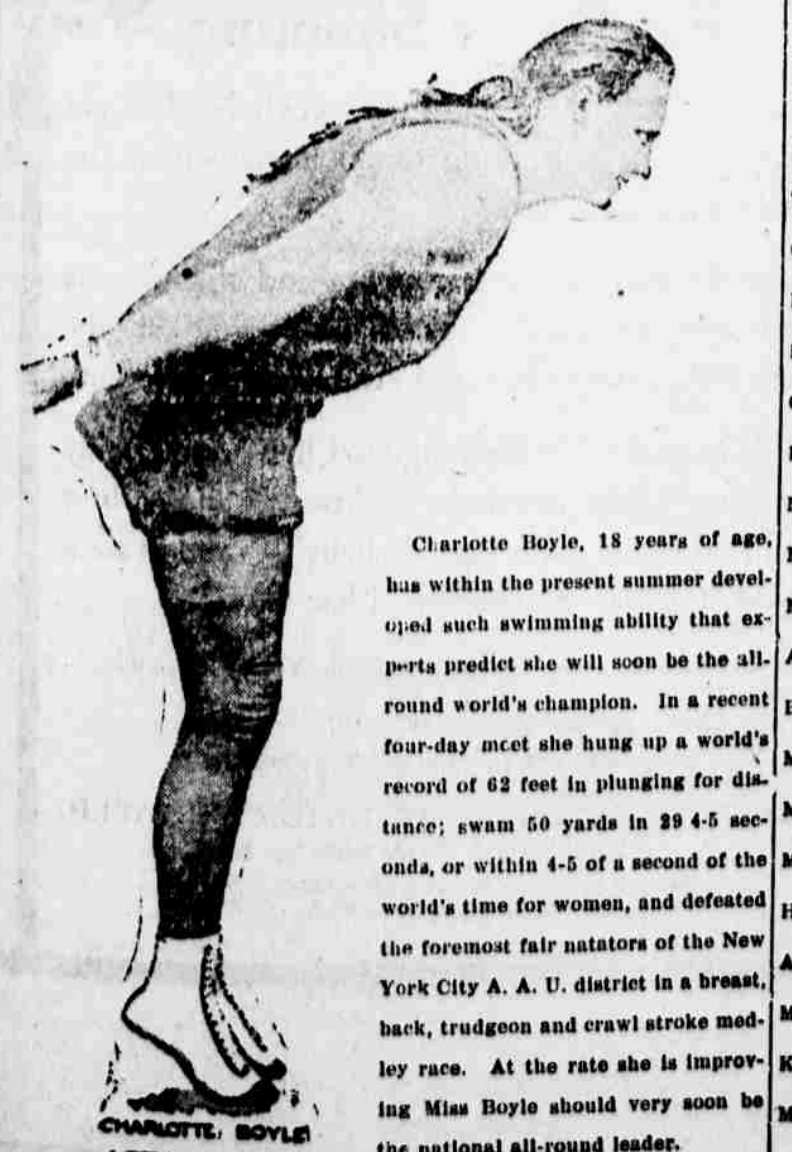
On the Lellehua plains in the ancient days Hawaiians were taught the lua, or a form of jujitsu, which involved a complete knowledge of the human anatomy, by which they were enabled by a twist of the fingers to dislocate joints of victims, and later to replace the dissembled members. It is a coincidence that the United States war department selected the old Lellehua Plains for an army garrison, and that a portion of the same should be set aside now for training officers for America's new national army.
