SUIT FOR COLLECTION

For the collection of \$40, alleged due for work with horses and plow in May of this year, action has been commenced in the office of Circuit Court Clerk Chastain by Dennis Provost, against Marvin French and Claude Daggett.

The complaint declares that the plaintiff was engaged by the defendants to prepare ground for the planting of potatoes in Mills and Industrial additions at the rate of \$6 per day, and that only \$35.65 was paid out of a total of \$76.20 due. The balance, plus \$35 attorney fees, and \$5 for a lien filed to secure payment, is asked of the court. John Irwin is the plaintiff's attorney.
