DAMAGING QUAKE VISITS COLOMBIA

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 6.—Three hundred houses were reported destroyed, with an unknown number of casualties, as the results of a severe earthquake at Bogota, Colombia, a state department message stated today. The department had only meagre advices regarding the quake, which came to it via Baranquilla. The official report made no mention of casualties, which led officials to believe that if any loss of life took place it could not have been very heavy. Latin-American diplomats had no information on the subject.

INVENTORY OF RUSSIA TAKEN

PETROGRAD, Sept. 6.—A commission has been appointed to prepare an inventory and valuation of the properties of the Russian state. N. Pokrovski, president of the central war industrial commission, will direct the work. The inventory will comprise lands, forests, railroads, factories, workshops and other profit yielding state undertakings. The government's aim is to alleviate the burden of taxation by inaugurating a less wasteful and more enterprising system of management.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—Breakfast as a political and social function is being revived. Premier Lloyd George used a breakfast party to announce the success of the Paris conference to a party of Frenchmen, and has had numbers of breakfasts at 10 Downing street when business is freely discussed. 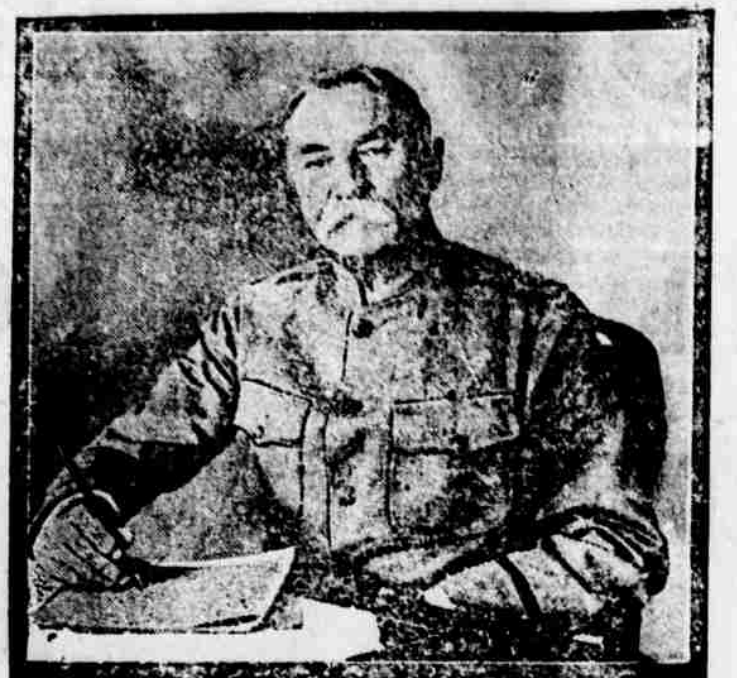

Drouth Forces Stock Sales Thruout State

PORTLAND, Sept. 6.—Unless rain comes soon to break the drouth thruout Oregon, considerable loss in cattle and sheep is anticipated on account of poor pasturage, according to the summary of state crop conditions for the week ending September 1st, issued here today by the government weather bureau. The summary reads: "More moderate temperatures, but drouth still unbroken. "Later reports show somewhat better yields of barley, oats, rye, spring wheat and winter wheat than first indicated, but of light weight. Grain practically all harvested, except in south central counties. "Owing to poor pasturage and the high prices for feed, surplus stock is being freely marketed, and considerable loss in cattle and sheep is anticipated unless rain comes soon. "Hog picking is becoming general and bean harvest has begun, with both crops light. Corn, potatoes and sugar beets are averaging only fair, but fruit prospects are good."

Red Cross to Assist Families of Soldiers

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 6.—As the first step to a plan to train volunteer Red Cross workers for home service during the war, the department of civilian relief of the American Red Cross is holding a conference of home service director here today.

While the government will assume the care of dependent families of soldiers, there will be needs for other than material aid which the Red Cross plans to provide. It will be able to place at the disposal of families medical and legal aid together with advice and suggestion on those affairs which ordinarily are settled by the husband. In his absence the Red Cross will act as an elder brother to his family. This is called home service.

Finds a Picture of Henry VII

GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 6.—An interesting art discovery has just been made here by a Luxemburg antiquary, which, if confirmed, will fill a vacancy in England's historical records. M. Jean Bervard has found a miniature on wood which he identifies as a portrait of Henry VII, the first of the Tudor dynasty. No portrait of this monarch is known here to exist in any museum or private collection. M. Bervard, without giving details as to how or where he discovered this unique work, says that it was painted by Geoffrey Tory de Bourges (1480-1533), and is the only painting known by him, altho he was an engraver and drew illustrations for four historical works.

GERMANS NOW LACK FOR CORK

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 6.—Cork is at a premium in Germany, as the country does not produce any and the entire blockade has interrupted all channels of supply. Used corks, especially those of champagne bottles, are eagerly purchased, and they bring high prices. Two chemists of Plauen, Saxony, have applied for a patent for making artificial cork from a tough specie of toadstools, which grow in abundance in the Saxon forests.

Netherlands East Indies Needs American Capital

THE HAGUE, Aug. 23.—Correspondent of Associated Press—"I regard it as the most desirable that more American capital should be invested in the Netherlands East Indies, and I have done constantly what I could to promote that end," declared J. B. van der Houven van Oordt, one of three Hollaanders who have just been charged with an official mission to Washington in connection with the pending export question, that so vitally concerns the Netherlands. Mr. van Oordt is a colonial official and authority. He has been under-secretary of state for the colonies, and has also filled the post of vice president of the council of the Netherlands East Indies. To the correspondent of the Associated Press, Mr. van Oordt pointed out that there has been a big increase in the commercial intercourse between America and Dutch India since the war, and particularly since the establishment of a direct steamship line between Java and San Francisco. "The five boats now engaged in that service," he said, "are always packed with goods. Rubber, and all kinds of tropical products are shipped to the United States, and the boats return laden with railroad rolling stock, machinery, automobiles, airplanes, and the like. If only the ships were available, the service might easily be extended to advantage." "But the amount of American capital operating in the colony is small in comparison with the British, German, French and Belgian capital. It is true there has been an increase in recent years. There is one American rubber estate in the island of Sumatra that is the largest plantation in the world, and special ships run to United States ports to carry its produce thither. But a great deal more might profitably be done, especially now that money is so plentiful in the Union. The sugar, rubber, tea and other agricultural branches offer enormous scope for profitable investment, not to speak of mining possibilities. "Although there are at present very few in the country, Americans are popular in the Netherlands East Indies, and they and their enterprises are assured of a most cordial welcome. There is every prospect of a big extension of the relations between the two countries, to our mutual advantage."

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6.—The arbitration agreement between the Southern Pacific company and 8,000 members of the four railway brotherhoods, whose differences with the company recently led to a strike vote, will be signed this week, according to an announcement made today by General Manager Scott.
