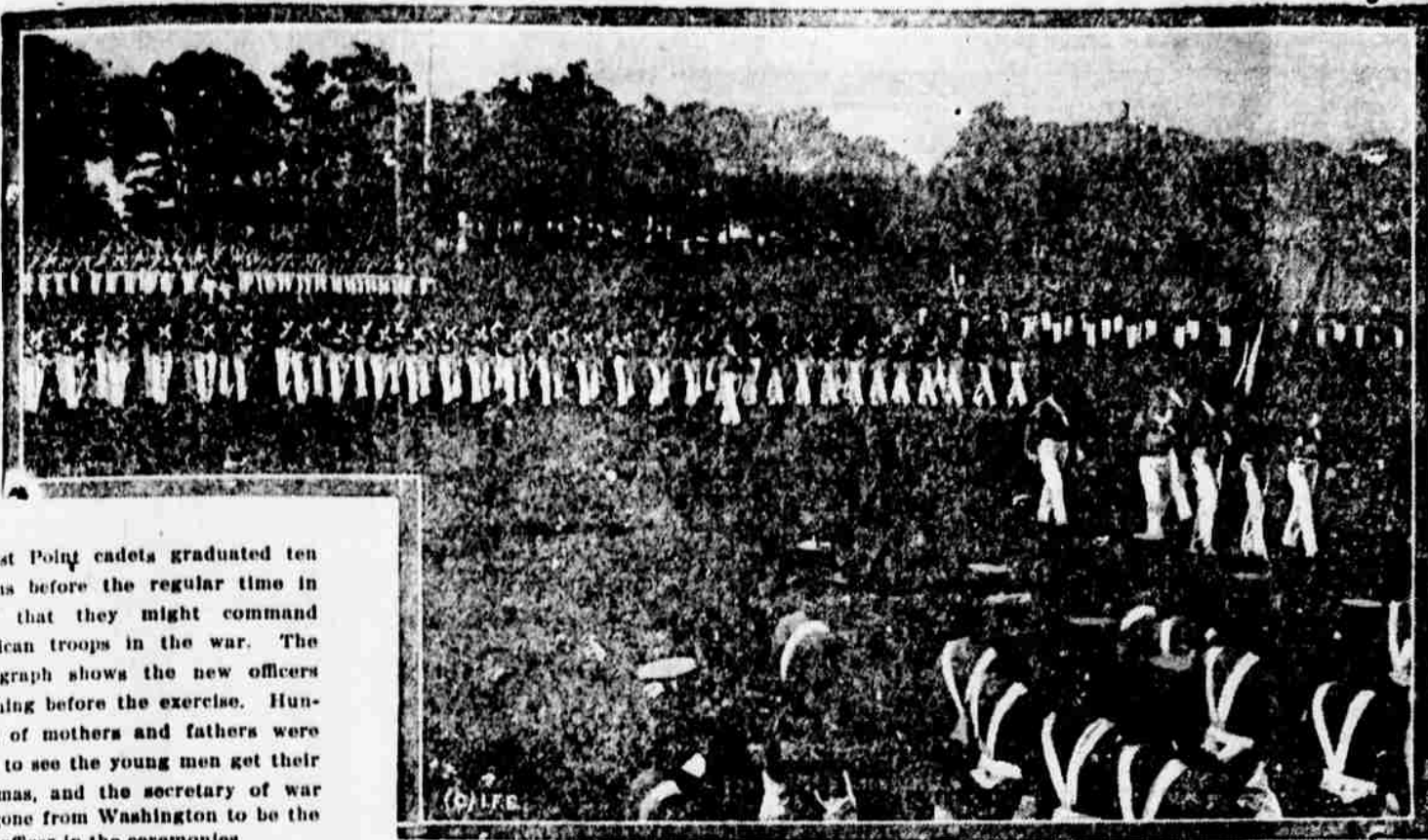


West Point Cadets Graduating Into the War

Hundreds of mothers and fathers were there to see the young men get their diplomas, and the secretary of war had gone from Washington to be the chief officer in the ceremonies.

These young men are to have two weeks at home, and then they must join the regular army to prepare troops for France. Within a short

time most of them will be on the firing line there. Every member of the class is wild with the idea of

going to war; he wants to get into the fray just as soon as the government can send him to France. He

shows the spirit which has actuated West Point graduates ever since the foundation of the military academy.

Bird Hunting Season Unchanged This Year

Efforts of the Local Sportsmen and Officials to Secure An Earlier Season Fails for 1917 Because of a Clerical Error Made in Records at Washington

Efforts of the Klamath Sportsmen's Association to secure an earlier date for the hunting season on migratory waterfowl this year were unsuccessful, altho the matter will be satisfactorily adjusted by next year, and the season hereafter will open on September 16th and run to December 31st.

It is believed by local sportsmen that a two-weeks' earlier season here will be a big inducement to visiting tourists to remain in this section, and the matter was thoroly gone over

at a meeting last May, when Federal Inspector E. S. Stratton was present. The following letter received by Fred Fleet as secretary of the Klamath Sportsmen's Association, gives the details which have delayed the season opening for twelve months: "Referring to the meeting of your sportsmen on May 18th, at which the subject of obtaining an earlier opening season on migratory waterfowl was discussed, and in order that there may be no confusion concerning the matter, I desire to call your

attention to the following facts. "At the earnest solicitation of many others interested in Eastern Oregon, Eastern Washington, and in Idaho, the Department of Agriculture determined to offer amendments to the federal regulations for the protection of migratory waterfowl, shore birds, etc., fixing the open season in the above territories from September 16th to December 31st next following, inclusive.

"On February 9th, as I stated at that meeting, the bureau notified the Oregon Fish and Game Commission of its determination to propose amendments to the federal regulations embracing the above dates for the open season on waterfowl for all that section of Oregon east of the summit of the Cascade mountains, and at the same time suggested to the commission that the Oregon laws be amended to conform to the contemplated amendments to the federal regulations.

Senator Julien A. Hurley of Vale attempted to fix such open season in his senate bill 281, which, however, only embraces Malheur, Harney, Lake and Grant counties, but unfortunately, thru a clerical error, no doubt, the wording of the bill is such as to make an open season on waterfowl, etc., all year, which, of course, nullifies its usefulness.

"Pending legislation in congress somewhat delayed the publication of the proposed amendments to the fed-

eral regulations, as set forth in the enclosed service and regulatory announcements, which will not become effective in Eastern Oregon, Eastern Washington, until on and after October 15th next, whenever approved by the president.

"Under the treaty between the United States and Great Britain for the protection of migratory birds, the department of agriculture, after the preparation of the regulations, shall allow a period of three months in which said regulations may be examined and considered before final adoption, permitting, when deemed proper, public hearings thereon.

"That period of time, as you will note, will not have expired until October 15th next, consequently the open season in Eastern Oregon and Eastern Washington, on waterfowl, will remain the same as last year, viz.: October 1st.

"I regret exceedingly this unfortunate situation, but unforeseen circumstances over which the bureau had no control delayed the publication of the regulations to such an extent that sportsmen in Eastern Oregon and Eastern Washington will not be able to avail themselves, this year, of the advantages accruing by reason of the establishment of an earlier season. Next year, however, Eastern Oregon, Eastern Washington and all of Idaho will have the same Federal open season, September 16 to December 31, inclusive, but since a

state date governs when it opens the season later or closes it earlier than the federal regulations, it will be necessary for the Oregon laws to be uniform with the federal law.

"We, of course, cannot suspend or set aside the operation of the federal law or regulations, however much our sympathies may run that way, and it is hoped the sportsmen will realize this fact, and not be governed by erroneous statements from unauthorized sources.

"I trust you will give this matter due publicity to the end that all of your sportsmen may be fully informed of the true situation. Yours very truly,

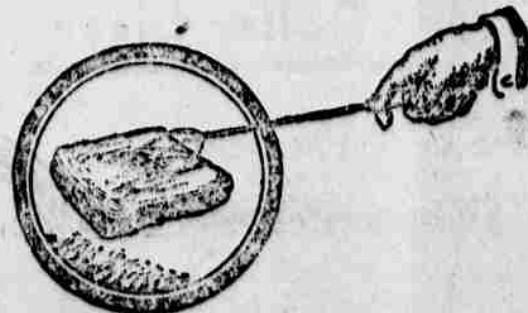
