# Captured Boat Proves Nest Of Undesirables

## Crowd of Alleged Slackers Believed to Be Escaping American Draft, Along With Several Outlaws Are Arrested on the Steamer Anvil

SAN DIEGO, Sept. 13.—That the gasoline schooner Anvil, captured Sunday south of Turtle Bay, 300 miles south of this port, has on board twenty-seven men thought to be slackers from the American draft, three or four alien enemies and an alleged murderer, was the assertion

of federal and police authorities interested in the case. According to the local police, one of the men thought to be aboard is Ben Rizotta, wanted by the New York police in connection with the fatal shooting of Barnett Raff, wealthy New York poultry dealer, on November 14, 1914. Rizotta's brother Dan Rizotta,

was arrested in Los Angeles May 25 of this year, and was returned to New York, where according to word received here from Inspector Faurot of New York, he is being held in connection with the shooting. At the time of Raff's death the case was referred to as a "black hand" case, and the police went on that theory for some time. After Dan Rizotta's arrest by a squad of Los Angeles detectives, Ben was traced to Ensenada, from which point the Anvil steamed bound for Mazatlan.

Two others who were alleged to be implicated in the murder of Raff and also in the events which led up to the killing, the so-called "Washington market conspiracy," were Frank Ferraro and John Archello. They were tried in New York for conspiracy and sentenced to death. After thirty days spent in the death cells at Sing Sing prison, their sentences were commuted until the Rizotta brothers could be arrested and tried. A confession by Archello mentions the Rizotta brothers.

Federal authorities say that they had reason to suspect that some ammunition might have been shipped on the Anvil. At any rate her journey north on orders from the United States Pacific Coast patrol fleet to proceed direct to an American port is being watched with much interest. The Anvil is being conveyed by a United States warship. It was announced that a large detachment of troops would be at the pier to take care of any trouble that might develop when the Anvil is brought to port.

# HOOVER EXPLAINS STAND ON NEW WHEAT PRICES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 13.—Food Administrator Hoover has sent a memorandum to Senator McNary reaffirming his position against fixing a Portland price basis on wheat and declaring it does not rest with the food administration to alter the findings of the president's price committee. He says if Portland were made a basic market, wheat would flow there only to be hauled eastward again, accumulating a 50 cent differential which the government would have to absorb or the consumer pay. Owing to the absence of President Wilson and word from Portland that a committee is expected from there, the conference with the president has now been postponed until late this week.

Fear of being headed off, as was the People's Council, is the explanation of the secrecy. Detectives met one train on which forty men were riding, but all escaped. Eight out of 100 coming from Staples, Minn., were arrested as the train left there. All had left the train when a squad of detectives met it here. The I. W. W. hall was elaborately decorated here and the organization's band has been practicing for hours.
