ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS

Can you tell me why egg whites sometimes curdle while I am whipping them?—Young Housewife, Klamath Falls.

There are several reasons why the whites of eggs curdle while beating; it usually happens if weak, stale eggs are used, the whites of which are very watery. Curdling is often the result of beating the mixture all over the bowl instead of keeping it well in the center. Particles of the meringue remain untouched by the beater; these quickly separate, the small cells burst, and when mixed in with the remainder of the mixture cause the whole to become soft. The whites should be slowly beaten up first, and the speed increased as they become firm. If they are made under proper conditions, no sugar need be added until the whites are almost ready for use.

Numbness of Fingers.

I am greatly troubled by numbness of my fingers and hands. Can you tell me if there is some simple remedy?—Mrs. A. S. N., Fort Klamath.

Exercise in the open air as much as possible, and take several deep breathing exercises two or three times daily. Above all, keep from worry. Poor circulation is frequently the cause of this trouble, and sometimes, as a last resort, a change of climate is very beneficial.

Is it possible in any way to remove a rather deep dent in a chair arm?—Mrs. J. S. L., City.

Over the dent or scratch to be treated place a piece of blotting paper folded four or five times at least, and wet thoroughly with water. Have the paper saturated, but not dripping. Heat the iron and then press it firmly upon the folded blotting paper. When

the paper begins to dry under the iron look at the mark under treatment. It will be found to have drawn up considerably. If it is still noticeable, a second and a third treatment can be given. By that anything but a deep cut will have become inconspicuous. Apply furniture polish and polish thoroughly.

BIG ERUPTION AT MT. LASSEN

SMOKE ASCENDS TEN THOUSAND FEET—BELIEVED NEW VENT OPENED IN CRATER OF MT. LASSEN

REDDING, Calif., Sept. 19.—A big eruption of Mount Lassen began at 5:15 Monday morning, and for two hours a column of dense smoke issued from the volcano, rising to a height of 10,000 feet. Observers who have been watching the activity of the mountain for three years, believe that the eruption marks the opening of a new vent in the mountain's crater. Heretofore nearly all the eruptions have been from the main crater, in Shasta County, but many believe the last eruption was from a new crater in Lassen or Tehama counties. As seen from Redding the smoke ascended from a point some distance from the main crater. Some expressed the belief that the new vent is entirely distinct from Mount Lassen itself, and that it is, in fact, fifteen to twenty miles away, near Dumps hill.

Jews Hold Two Championships and Are Claiming Four



For the first time in the history of the ring there are now two Jew champions of different classes. Bennie Leonard is the light weight champion, while Ted (Kid) Lewis is the welterweight champion. Al McCoy, another, claims the middleweight championship, while a fourth, Battling Levinsky, claims the light-heavy weight championship. Benny Leonard is Benjamin Leiner, and his parents came from Europe. Lewis is Gershon Mandeloff, and his home is in England. McCoy is Albert Rudolph. Levinsky started in the boxing business as Barney Williams, but he later came into the hands of Dan Morgan, an astute manager, who believed his name was an asset in the East, and he restored the Levinsky, with the prefix "Battling."

California Starts Settlement System

BERKELEY, Calif., Sept. 19.—California has virtually completed plans to branch forth in the land colonization business. This new undertaking is the first time in America that such a land settlement policy has been introduced. Under the new land settlement system, authorized by the last legislature, a young man with little capital may make a start as an independent farmer, cultivating a farm he himself owns, with anywhere from twenty to thirty-six years to pay for his land. As the first step, the state land settlement board has announced that it is now ready to purchase from 4,000 to 6,000 acres of farm land, the board then to improve, subdivide and settle the land. When the land has been purchased, the board will sell it on small initial payments, with two

ty to thirty-six years to pay the balance and will create a colony devoted to mixed farming, in which rotation of crops, the growing of livestock and the maintenance of the soil's fertility will all be assumed. Before the land is selected, Prof. Thomas F. Hunt, dean of the University of California College of Agriculture, will report on the suitability of the tracts submitted for closer settlement, and the president of the state water commission will report on the water rights pertaining to the lands offered or to be purchased with them. The land settlement system by the state has been in effect some time in Australia, New Zealand, Denmark, Ireland and a score of other countries, from whence reports say it has been found to be successful.

There Is No Mud Like Flanders Mud

LONDON, Sept. 19.—Major General Frederick B. Maurice, director of military operations at the war office, who has just returned from one of his frequent trips to the front in France, was asked by the Associated Press correspondent what phase of battle front activity had on this occasion impressed him most. "Always the same thing—the mud" he replied. "It is the most remarkable mud in the world. As an enemy it is more persistent than the German and more deadly than his artillery. "I had a remarkable object lesson of the power of the Flanders mud during my week in the battle area. I visited a hospital where they had two of our men who had been rescued after spending thirty hours in the grip of a Flanders mud hole. The two men, advancing across No Man's land in the semi-darkness, had stumbled into an old shell hole and found themselves inextricably in the clutches of the thick mud at the bottom. When they were found they had been there for thirty hours, and had been drawn waist deep into the clay. "All sorts of expedients were tried to extricate them, and it was finally

deemed necessary to fit a harness to them and pull them out with a team of mules. Both men had their hips and knees dislocated in the process. That is Flanders mud." HARMONY LACKING IN DUEL EMPIRE MANY DEMONSTRATIONS AGAINST GERMAN GOVERNMENT MEN HAVE TAKEN PLACE RECENTLY IN HUNGARY. ROME, Sept. 19.—Austria-Hungary is reported sending it increasingly difficult to keep in agreement with Germany. Diplomatic advice received here today told of an epidemic of riots throughout the dual empire and political differences as to Prussianism that indicate a growing breach between the two Teutonic powers. Austria is suffering from lack of

food, according to reports here. Most of the disorders, detailed news of which has been suppressed, have been due to this cause. Thousands of the people are making pilgrimages to various shrines, imploring divine intercession for peace.

Prussian officers, it was asserted, are frequently insulted on the streets of various Austrian cities.

Italy's successful drive east of Gorizia is likewise reported to be causing widespread apprehension throughout Emperor Charles' dominion.
