ABERDEEN STRIKE THOUGHT ENDED

ALTHO STRIKE IS NOT CALLED OFF, MARRIED MEN ARE GIVEN PERMISSION TO GO BACK ON TEN HOUR BASIS

ABERDEEN, Wash., Sept. 21.—Lumber workers here regard the strike against ten hour labor in Western Washington as practically ended, as a result of a statement issued by the executive committee of the Timber Workers Union here, which, while insisting that the eight-hour strike will not be called off until the eight hours is won, grants permission to union members, especially married men to return to work on a ten hour basis.

ASTONISHING PRODUCE FROM DENVER GARDENS

DENVER, Sept. 21.—Denver's war gardens will raise, on the basis of prevailing prices, \$2,000,000 worth of "garden truck," according to P. L. Clarke, head of the department of grades and agriculture of the Denver public schools, who had a leading part in the movement. There are in Denver 30,000 gardens, averaging 25x60 feet each, and totaling 60,000,000 square feet of land. These gardens placed side by side would extend more than half across the state of Colorado from north to south.

Most of the produce is of the expensive truck garden variety. Thousands of these gardens have proven potatoes can be grown in Denver. To irrigate these plots the local water company furnished water free of charge for one vacant lot for each family, and without extra charge on premises having lawns.

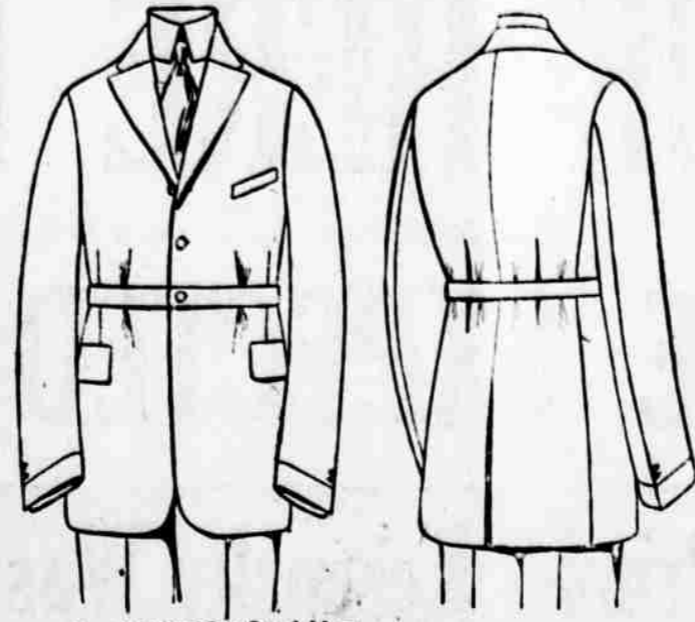

Imports and Exports Fall Off In July

Imports of merchandise for July, 1917, were valued at \$225,000,000, a decrease of \$81,000,000 compared with June, the high record month, but a gain of \$43,000,000 over July 1916, according to figures given out by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce. The imports for seven months ending July, 1917, were \$1,779,000,000, against \$1,469,000,000 in 1916. Free imports in July, 1917, were \$158,000,000, and dutiable imports \$68,000,000. For the seven months ending July, 1917, the free imports were \$1,259,000,000, and the dutiable were \$520,000,000. Merchandise entered free of duty in July amounted to 70 per cent of the total, and in the seven months to 71 per cent. For twelve months ending July 1917, the imports amounted to \$2,703,000,000 against \$1,915,000,000 in 1914.

Exports of merchandise in July, 1917 reached the lowest record since February, 1916. For the month of July the exports of merchandise amounted to \$374,000,000, against \$575,000,000 in June, 1917, and \$445,000,000 in July, 1916. For seven months ending July, 1917, exports for the twelve months ending July, 1917, were valued at \$6,221,000,000, the high record for any twelve months period, against \$2,358,000,000 in 1914, the twelve months preceding the breaking out of the war.

TWO U BOATS DESTROYED

CHRISTIANIA, Sept. 21.—An armed American steamer sunk a German submarine at sea while the submarine was shelling a neutral sailing ship, according to a report just received. A British torpedo boat destroyer sunk a second German submarine while it was attacking an armed steamer. Six prisoners were taken from the submarines.

CHICAGO MAYOR TURNS PATRIOTIC

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—Mayor William Hale Thompson, whose Americanism has been attacked by newspapers and prominent citizens, has issued a proclamation in which he said: "It is the duty of all patriotic citizens to stand by our country in times of controversy with any other country and to show in an unmistakable way that the American people stand behind the army and navy, which represents the majesty of our government." Thompson is the man who recently allowed the peace convention to be held in Chicago, contrary to the commands of the governor, and after it had been forbidden in several states of the Middle West.
