### Fall Clean-up for City Is Suggested

#### Interested Citizen Suggests General Inspection of Dairies and all Places Where Food and Drink are Manufactured or Handled Early in Fall of Each Year

Klamath Falls, with the idea of banking in the sunlight of sanitation and rendering the city pleasing to the eye, has inaugurated a custom of cleaning up every spring; a custom most laudable in any community, and which, we trust, will be maintained indefinitely. But why not, in view of the conditions confronting us this fall, enlarge upon the custom to the extent of having a fall clean-up of the entire city, say about the first Monday in October? And in conjunction with the general clean-up in the spring and fall, provide for a general inspection of our dairies and all places where food of any description and drinks are manufactured or handled for human consumption.
