**FEARFUL FLOOD NEAR PEKING**  
PEKING, Sept. 24.—(Delayed)—A rapidly rising flood threatens the destruction of Tien Tsin. Portions of the foreign concessions of the Chinese city are already inundated. A million Chinese are reported homeless, and the great plain southeast of Peking is covered with water.

Tien Tsin is situated seventy miles southeast of Peking, and is the location of a Chinese navy yard and naval school. It has a population of about 750,000.
