DANISH ARMY AGAIN REDUCED

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 29.—The Danish government has ordered another reduction in the size of the standing army. The step is taken, it is stated, "mainly for financial reasons, but also because discipline in the army has been weakened, and its quality deteriorated under protracted service."

At the beginning of the European war Denmark called up 45,000 men in addition to the 12,500 who are always under training. This force was gradually reduced to 25,000, and a further reduction of about 25 per cent has now been decided upon.
