Liberty Loan Drive Opens With Rush

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1.—Shortly after noon today the second great "Liberty Loan drive began in the Twelfth Federal Bank district, when 1,000 men and women opened the campaign at a luncheon held in the Palace hotel.

Speakers urged the necessity for an overwhelming response by the people to the government's second call for money with which to finance America's participation in the great war for the dual purpose of convincing her enemies, both abroad and at home, that the nation will brook no interference with her solemn pledge to put an end forever to militarism, autocracy and ruthlessness.

Among those who stirred the diners to frequent outbursts of patriotic

enthusiasm were Archbishop Edward J. Hanna, M. H. DeYoung, publisher of the San Francisco Chronicle; P. H. McCarthy, president of the State Building Trade's Council; James K. Lynch, governor of the Federal Reserve bank; C. C. Moore, president of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition; John A. Britton and others.

From now until October 27th, when the campaign closes, a whirlwind advance in force will be made by companies and brigades of volunteer workers to make the second Liberty Loan an impressive success.

George A. Van Smith, a former well known newspaperman and writer on political affairs, now assistant cashier of the Anglo and London-Paris National bank, has been made publicity manager.

Wide Spread Interest In Coming World Series

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—In the long history of World Series play for the championship of the baseball universe it is doubtful if any previous contest of this character aroused the widespread interest which has been engendered by the coming clash between the Chicago Americans and the New York Nationals. Although World Series play is not new to either of the cities represented by clubs in the finale of the professional baseball year, it will be the first time that New York and Chicago clubs have met for the premier honors of the diamond.

This is all the more remarkable when it is considered that the World Series dates back to 1884, and has continued in one form or another and with but few breaks, for more than thirty years. The ensuing series will be the twenty-sixth since the Providence club of the National League

faced the Metropolitan team of the American Association in the initial contest back in 1884, and emerged victor in three straight games. It will also be the thirteenth played under the code and jurisdiction of the national commission, which in 1905 arranged for an annual meeting between the pennant winning clubs of the two major leagues.

Of the twelve series staged under these rules, the American League teams have won seven and the National League teams five. Sixty-six games have been played, of which the Americans have won thirty-three and the Nationals thirty-one, with two resulting in tie contests. But one run divided the records of the two leagues in this respect, as during these sixty-six games the National League players have crossed the plate 223 times to their rivals 222.

RETURN OF STRIKERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29.—The return of 25,000 striking iron workers, engaged on the government's merchant marine program, who were scheduled to remain at work yesterday, on a temporary wage increase, was blocked by a refusal of the boilermakers union to accept terms stipulated in an agreement after a majority of unions had voted favorably. The boilermakers are meeting today to consider the matter.
