ASSAIL STUTTGART

PARIS, Oct. 3.—French aviators dropped half a ton of projectiles on the city of Stuttgart in reprisal for the German bombardment of Bar-le-Duc. Stuttgart is the capital of the kingdom of Wurtemberg, about 100 miles from the French border. It has a population of nearly 200,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 3.—Senator Wadsworth of New York has presented in the senate petitions from New York organizations asking the expulsion from the senate of Senators LaFollette, Stone and Gronna. The matter has been referred to the privileges and elections committee.

NATION YIELDS
VERY PROMISING

LATE ESTIMATES ON TOTAL YIELDS SHOW DECIDED INCREASE OVER EARLIER PREDICTIONS—LOAN BODIES

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 3.—Crop reports published on September 1st confirmed previous predictions that the corn crop this year will exceed all previous yields. The current promise is for a yield of 3,248,000,000 bushels. This is an improvement from the 3,191,000,000 bushel forecast of August, and compares with an actual crop of 2,583,000,000 bushels in 1916 and an average of 2,754,000,000 bushels for the five crops of 1911-15.

The total wheat yield is given at 668,000,000 bushels. The 1916 harvest was 640,000,000 bushels, while the five year average (1911-15) was 806,000,000 bushels.

The yield of oats is well above the average. Threshing of winter wheat was in progress at the date of the report. Plowing for the next winter wheat crop was also progressing in most Central and Northern states, except where delayed by dry weather. Some seeding of winter wheat and rye had begun.

Yields of quality of spring wheat were better than was anticipated in many sections of the North. Harvesting of spring wheat, oats and barley mostly was completed, and threshing was making excellent progress. Barley was yielding well where ir-

rigated in Pacific Coast states.

Drought damaged flax considerably in North Dakota and Northwestern Minnesota, while the crop is irregular in South Dakota, where harvesting had begun.

White potatoes showed favorable development in Central and Northern sections. Rain was needed in some districts, and there was some frost damage in the extreme North.

Sweet potatoes developed well in most Southern states, and were being harvested in the Southeastern states. Rich harvesting was in progress in the lower Mississippi Valley, with the crop generally light in Texas. It is in good condition in Arkansas and excellent in California.

Buckwheat is somewhat late, but is generally promising.

Sugar beets were growing well in the Rocky Mountain region and on the Pacific Coast, with an excellent outlook in California.

Weather for tobacco was favorable for ripening and harvesting. Cutting and curing was in progress in many districts. It was too dry and somewhat cool for the best development in Wisconsin.

More than 4,000 farm loan associations are reported in process of organization under the Federal Farm Loan act. Loans approved during August amounted to \$19,671,923.
