OXMAN IS DISCHARGED

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4.—The charge that Frank Oxman of Durkee, Ore., perjured his testimony against Thomas J. Mooney, convicted of the murder in the bomb case, has been discharged and has left for Oregon.

PRINTING BUREAU

HEAD RESIGNS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 5.—James E. Ralph, director of the bureau of engraving and printing, whose administration has been under investigation, resigned late yesterday.

JAPANESE OFFICIAL

DEFENDS ACTION OF U. S.

TOKIO, Oct. 5.—Baron Shimpel Goto, Japan's home minister, has characterized the United States' ban on exportation of iron and steel as entirely necessitated by the war, and as declaring that it is unreasonable for Japan to expect an absolute cancellation or removal of the embargo. The only way for Japan to approach the question, he said, was to request some exceptional treatment affording Japan a smooth operation of the ship building industry. He believed the steel question would be settled satisfactorily. Baron Goto added:

"Recently the movement of the Japanese business bodies opposing the American embargo on iron and steel is becoming stronger, and some agitators at times indulge in utterances which are by no means pleasing to America to hear. Such an attitude on the part of our countrymen cannot be recommended. They should observe an attitude of calm circumspection, seeking the solution of the problem by moderate and conciliatory means. At the same time they must not begrudge making sacrifices in the cause of the war."

MOVIES ARE MAKING

PRESENCE OF GREEKS

ATHENS, Oct. 5.—The Greeks are forgetting Greek and learning French. This is not because the French expedition is here, or any allied domination over Greece, but is due to the moving pictures, for French has been adopted as the cinema language of Eastern Europe, just as it is the diplomatic language. The moving pictures are also public institutions in Greece and the Balkans generally. It is not confined to small halls, but is shown in the open at night, in vast central squares.

In front of the royal palace here is an esplanade where 50,000 people have demonstrated during the recent troubles over King Constantine. This is now given over at night to the cinema, with enormous crowds at the small tables, and no charge except for a drink. There are three performances, with some 10,000 people at each. And thus 30,000 people take an hour's French lesson nightly at this one spot.

TWO NEW GENERALS

TO BE CREATED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 5.—An administrative bill creating two generals in the army, to provide promotions for Generals Pershing and Bliss and for a number of lieutenant generals has been introduced in the senate. It is planned to rush it thru before adjournment.

EL PASO WOMEN

PREPARE FOR TRENCHES

EL PASO, Texas, Oct. 5.—Not content with meeting troop trains at all hours of the night and day to serve coffee and sandwiches to soldiers passing thru here, the women members of the El Paso Red Cross have obtained a drillmaster and are holding regular drills to perfect themselves in the rudiments of military tactics.
