PARIS, Oct. 6.—Doctor X. M. Vaillant, head of the radiographic service at the Lariboliere hospital in Paris, who had already lost several fingers in successive operations resulting from the use of the X-rays, has

just undergone the amputation of the left forearm from the same cause.

Dr. Vaillant persists in continuing his work in the Lariboliere hospital, in view of the value of his work to the wounded.

FIENDISH BRUTE ATTACKS WOMEN

DEFENSELESS WOMEN BEATEN MERCILESSLY BY UNKNOWN PROWLER IN SEATTLE—OFFICERS FIRE ON SUSPECTS

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 6.—Five shots were fired by the police today at fleeing prowlers, believed to be the so-called "woman slugs," who, with accomplices attacked five women in their homes in daylight yesterday.

The suspect was loitering in the residence district, and fled, escaping to the woods.

Two women frightened the "slugger" from their homes yesterday by screaming. One was kicked on the hand and foot. Another was found unconscious in the yard, and a fourth was bound to a table and beaten by the "slugger."

FOOTBALL STAR IN WOUNDED IN CHINA

PEKING, Oct. 6.—R. A. White, the

American engineer, who was more seriously injured than any other foreigner at the time of the conflict between Chang Hsun's troops and the republican troops from Tien Tsin on July 13th, is slowly recovering from his wounds. Mr. White was struck in the back by a bullet.

Mr. White is a native of Iowa, and ten years ago was one of the best known football players in the Middle West, where he was captain of the football team of the State University of Iowa. In football circles he was always known as "Cresco" White, Cresco being his native town.
