## New Cavalry Equipment Tested In Hard Ride

FORT BLISS, Texas, Oct. 8.—Cavalrymen have taken much interest in the 400 mile cavalry ride which was made from Douglas, Ariz.

The most interest is being manifested in the test of the new saddle, which is known as "the 1917 model," and which was designed to replace the old McClellan saddle, which has been in use in the army for many years. The saddle is described as a cross between a Texas cowboy saddle and a flat riding saddle. It has a high pommel, arched as is the cowboy saddle, but has no horn. The back of the saddle slopes more than the cowboy or McClellan saddle. The weight is distributed evenly, and pockets are provided for surplus equipment. The saddle is said by cavalry officers to be more roomy than the McClellan.

and especially well designed for men who are large or heavy in the saddle. The new saddle is strictly a thrusting saddle, two-edged, and with a large grip like a fencing sword. The rider is especially popular with the cavalry men. The bridle has the curb and snaffle fastened to the cheek strap with snaps, and this was the only weakness found in the saddle, as the officers said these snaps were easily unfastened by a nervous horse. The ride sling has a clip attached which holds the rifle to the rider's back, with the barrel protruding over the left shoulder, after the manner of Mexican cavalry rifles or carbines. This is a substitute for the rifle boot on the old cavalry equipment, by means of which the rifle was held perpendicular beside the rider.

## Clever Belgian Pilot Outwits German Patrols

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 18.—(Correspondence)—The Belgian motor boat Scalds recently ran the blockade from Germany, flying a German admiral's flag, and arrived safely in Holland with a load of prominent Belgian refugees. The incident has aroused much interest along the whole length of the Scheldt.

The Scalds formerly belonged to the Belgian government, and was confiscated by the Germans, who fitted her luxuriously for use by the highest officers. A Belgian pilot, "Jeff" Van Dingen, was given the post of captain

lives to escape. Jeff had orders to take the governor general from Antwerp to Brussels on the following Monday. He figured that if he cruised northward on Sunday and the guards along the Scheldt would think the governor general was taking a short trip to the frontier. He started at noon, hoisting the admiral's flag.

The Belgian civilians were hidden below deck, the captain and two assistants alone remained above deck. They passed the forts of St. Marie and Philip de Pearl and by Liefkenshiek and Doel, their flag everywhere saluted ceremoniously by the soldiers. At Doel the whole guard turned out.

Close to the frontier the motor stopped, gasoline being almost exhausted. A German patrol boat approached, but no assistance being asked, the boat apparently did not dare to come alongside a boat flying the admiral's flag. By a friendly salute Jeff intimated that he did not need assistance.

After some tinkering the motors were made to work a little longer, and the tide also helped. Thus the vessel reached Dutch waters, where it was visited by the Dutch patrol and given enough gasoline to get it to the nearest port, where the captain and passengers were warmly welcomed.
