

First Liberty Truck Ready for Business

LIMA, Ohio, Oct. 10.—The first Liberty motor truck for the United States army, product of the greatest motor-truck designers of the country and the combined genius of twelve motor-truck plants and sixty-two automobile factories, is completed at a local manufacturing plant.

The standardized machine, of which 35,000 copies will be turned out in the first half of 1918 for the army, is said to represent the perfection of automobile truck development. Its motor power is derived from the new Liberty motor, recently perfected at Washington by war department experts.

The first Liberty motor truck was built in the greatest secrecy, to protect it from enemy eyes. A building without windows and lighted only by skylights, housed the truck during the three weeks of its construction.

The plant was closely guarded by armed men night and day. As an added precaution, a second truck was assembled in an eastern city. As each part was completed here, a duplicate was dispatched to a northern New York town, where mechanics assembled a second machine. Similar precautions surrounded parts manufactured in the sixty-odd factories which contributed to the machine. As each part was completed it was dispatched to Lima in charge of an army representative who kept factory officials informed of his progress by telegraph. No one company knows the complete design or what other company made other parts.

The completed truck is said to be the strongest, compared to the load it is designed to carry ever turned out in this country. Every part has been enormously strengthened to cope with the rough usage of war. It carries more than 1,000 pounds of dead weight more than commercial trucks of corresponding capacity. The truck will be used only for the army, and will not be placed on the market, government officials say. Because of its increased weight it is said the truck is unsuited for normal use because of the large amount of gasoline and oil required for its operation. Also it is said that the factories which have given free use of their patents for their design, stipulated that the new truck was to be for government use only.

In outward appearance the car represents no radical departure from the usual army motor truck. However, every part has been so standardized that when the first order of 35,000 trucks are delivered to the army, it is said they could all be torn down, the parts mixed indiscriminately, and 35,000 complete trucks reassembled. All parts are interchangeable, which is expected to give added efficiency at the front.

Odd Ceremonies at Hague Conference

THE HAGUE, Sept. 28.—(Correspondence)—At the recent conference held here by British and German delegates to discuss the question of treatment and exchange of prisoners, the Germans entered the conference from a door on one side of the room and the English from a door on the opposite side. The Dutch delegates were already seated at the table in the middle of the room. No conversation took place except upon the business of the conference.

Before the conference ended the chief of the German delegation rose and insisted upon thanking the British warmly for the way in which their prisoners had been treated. He said

no other country had behaved so well. The English commissioners bowed their thanks, but did not return the compliment.

JAP INTERESTS IN SOUTH AMERICA ARE GROWING

TOKIO, Oct. 10.—Japan is planning to establish a legation at Buenos Aires on account of the increasing Japanese interests there. Argentine affairs are now handled by the legation at Chili.

Also, in view of the growth of Japan's trade with South America it is likely that several new consulates will be established.

First Line of Defense of the Giants of New York, the Infield

The New York Giants' infield is composed of Holke, first base; Herzog, second base; Fletcher, shortstop, and Zimmerman, third base. Their batting averages for the season has been as follows: Holke .275, Herzog .225, Fletcher .252, and Zimmerman .295. They do not average so high as the infielders of the White Sox. With Eddie Collins, second base for the White Sox, going at the speed he showed with the Athletics, the infield is inferior to that of the Chicago club. There is considerable question if Collins is up to his old form.

Democracy Course for American Children

American school children will soon have put before them material for "education in democracy," at the request of President Wilson, thru the co-operation of the food administrator and United States Commissioner of Education, P. P. Claxton.

A series of bulletins entitled "Lessons in Community and National Life" will be issued to pupils of all schools, calling attention to the necessity for conservation of food and other national resources. They will serve the further purpose of training pupils in recognition of their rights and obligations in the democracy in which they live.

The food administrator has addressed a letter to school authorities, outlining the plan as follows: "In keeping with the plan outlined

by the President, the United States Food Administration will co-operate with the department of the interior in issuing thru the bureau of education a series of bulletins which will contain 'Lessons in Community and National Life.' These lessons will serve the very urgent immediate purpose of calling attention to the necessity of conserving food and all other resources of the nation. They will serve at the same time the broader purpose of training pupils in the schools to recognize their rights and obligations in the co-operative society in which they live.

"I urge all school officers to promote with vigor this plan for the more definite and comprehensive teaching of democracy. Faithfully yours, (Signed) 'HERBERT HOOVER.'"

Southern Physicians Are in Session Today

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 10.—The Southern California Homeopathic Medical Society convened here today for its annual convention with physicians from many Southern California cities and towns in attendance.

Today the society was formed into sections, and specialists in various fields of medicine and surgery presented papers, followed by general discussions. Among the topics so presented were questions in the fields of

PACIFIST MEETING ABRUPTLY CANCELLED

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Oct. 10.—Under a renewed threat of state officials to forcibly prevent meetings of pacifist organizations in South Dakota, leaders of the People's Council of America for Democracy and Peace precipitately abandoned plans for holding a state conference here today.

William C. Rempter, secretary of the organization, in a statement scoring "Kaiser Norbeck," declared that the delegates would come here and hold a private meeting at which future plans would be decided upon.

The action of the pacifist leaders came after an announcement of Governor Peter Norbeck that every force of the state would be used to prevent the conference. What steps the state authorities will take should the council's delegates attempt a "private meeting" is problematical.
