Cuban Women Active In Red Cross Support

HAVANA, Oct. 16.—The Cuban Red Cross Society, of which Mme. Mariana Menocal, wife of the president of Cuba, is chairman, has begun the work of equipping a 100-bed hospital unit, manned by a staff of Cuban physicians and nurses, for active service on the western front in France. This enterprise, which will reach completion at an early date, is to be financed by a fund of \$1,000,000, which Cuban women prominent in society here have set themselves out to raise.

Announcement of the plans of the Cuban Red Cross followed a special meeting in the presidential palace presided over by the wife of the president, and attended by all the Cuban Red Cross directors and representatives of various government departments and the Cuban press.

The encouragement the Red Cross has received from capitalists through the island republic and the progress made in assembling of equipment and the training of volunteer workers, lead the Red Cross officials to believe that before the fund has been completed the unit will be ready for service.

Co-operation, which was recently inaugurated between the Cuban and American Red Cross officials has helped make this Cuban unit possible.

With upwards of \$100,000 already in hand, in advance of the canvass for the million dollar fund, various steps, some of them unusual in this connection, are being utilized to bring the fund to a quick completion. Each sugar "ingenio," or plantation mill, in Cuba, has been asked to set aside \$1,000 for the Red Cross, and many of them already have done so.

A national Red Cross "tag day" to be observed in all parts of the republic, is likewise planned, and according to the announcement of Mme. Menocal, workrooms have already been opened. In the old Havana post office a complete Red Cross workshop is in operation, with electrically operated sewing machines, donated by Mme. Menocal and Senora Blanca de Marti, wife of the Cuban minister of war and navy.

Norway Would Wipe Out German Spies

CHRISTIANIA, Oct. 6.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Norway is making vigorous efforts to stamp out German espionage within its shores. The Swedish revelations have given a great impetus to the anti-spy campaign.

The interned German ship, Berlin, is to be removed from Himmelviken Aqueenford, further inside the coast line. It has been urged for a long time that the position of the Berlin offered opportunities for espionage on shipping.

Guards have been placed not only over all Norwegian military establishments, but also at some of the large industrial works. Thus a military picket has been posted at the Fredrickstad iron works, where the new slips for 10,000-ton ships are now

ready, and trespassers have been warned to keep away.

Under a law of July, 1917, the commune of Christiania has ordained that the chief of police may forbid persons who are not Norwegians to reside in the commune longer than a certain fixed period. A new law concerning the necessity of passports and the expulsion of aliens is to be rigidly enforced after October 1st.

A spy case which caused a great flurry for a time was that of a Dane named Kristiansen, who has now been expelled from the country. The whole affair developed into an impudent fraud, with one of the belligerent governments as the victim. Kristiansen was obtaining money from this government by giving or promising to give information of no real value about another.

MAN BELIEVED SPY INTERNED AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Oct. 16.—Carl Drager, suspected of being a German spy, who was arrested October 2d near the armory by the police for being an alien enemy without a permit, and turned over to Federal authorities for investigation, has been interned at Vancouver barracks on orders of United States Attorney Reames.

Drager had more than \$200 in his possession. He was said to have been traveling under several fictitious names, one of his aliases being Robert Dale. Until his removal to Vancouver he was held in the county jail. "Citizen of the world" is the way he termed himself to the federal authorities. He said he would not recognize the flag of any nation.

He came to the United States in July, 1915, from Australia. When asked where he got the money he said he had saved from his wages as a laborer. He is 27 years old.

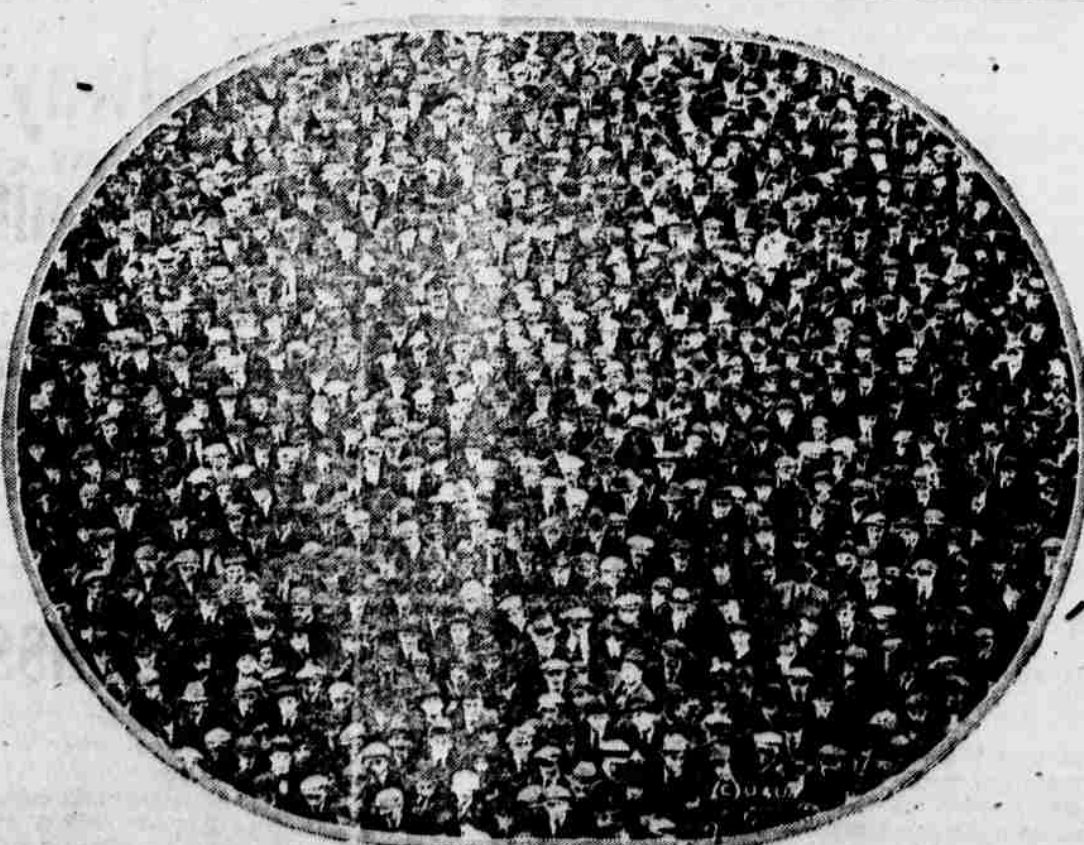
TO MAKE LEATHER FROM SHARK SKINS
