POLICE FIND HEADLESS BODY

CORPSE OF WOMAN WHO HAS BEEN DEAD ABOUT FOUR WEEKS FOUND BY POLICE OF SEATTLE NEAR CITY LIMITS

SEATTLE, Oct. 16.—The police will ask the British Columbia authorities to aid in the efforts to find the murderer of an unidentified woman, whose headless body was found near the city limits here. The woman had evidently been dead about four months.

A letter found on her body bore a British Columbia postmark.

LATER—Earl O'Brien of Seattle has identified the headless body as Miss Ruth Demeritt, aged 17, a resident of Kirkland, a suburb. O'Brien, whose name was attached to the note found on the body, said she went to a dance a month ago, and had not been seen since.

War Tax Imposed On Transportation

Transportation of Humans Is Increased Eight Per Cent and Ordinary Freight Gets an Addition of Three. Ten Per Cent Is Added For Pullman Accommodations

Still more evidence of the expense of carrying on the great war will be noted after the first of November, when the new war tax of 8 per cent on passenger rates and 3 per cent on all freight shipments become effective.

Ticket agents will collect the war tax at the time of the sale of transportation. The tax on cash fares will be collected by conductors, who will also be responsible for collecting the tax on tickets sold prior to November 1, and not used until that day or later, provided agents have not already collected the tax and made a notation to that effect on the ticket.

The rate of 10 per cent will apply on the purchase of seats in observation cars, berths or staterooms on the river steamers, say the Southern Pa-

cific. Sleeping car tickets also come in for 10 per cent, the method of collection to be announced by the Pullman company.

The 3 per cent tax on freight charges offers no exemption either as to amount of distance, except on shipments for the United States government of the states, and on export and import business, and strictly company business, such as the transport of materials for the use of the carrier itself or its subsidiaries over its own lines. A special clause excludes also amusement business, such as theatrical and circus trains, which come under different provisions of the bill. While the government holds the carriers responsible for the collection of this tax, the bill provides that the person purchasing the service shall pay the tax.

Civil War Veterans Will Meet At Vicksburg

VICKSBURG, Miss., Oct. 16.—Veterans of the '60's, some who wore the blue and some who wore the gray, gathered here today for a four days' reunion on the field where they met in battle more than half a century ago.

Congress made an appropriation of \$150,000 to cover the expense of the reunion, which is held under the direction of the Secretary of War, "in commemoration of a half century of peace and good fellowship." Legislatures of ten states, mostly in the North, took official cognizance of the celebration and appropriated sums aggregating \$200,000 to provide transportation to Vicksburg for the veterans. These states are California, Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, New York, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Arkansas.

Near the trenches where Union and

Confederate armies contested so bitterly in 1863 the camp of the survivors of the famous battle has been pitched. It is located in the National Military Park, which is a restoration of the siege lines. The park is about three miles from Vicksburg. It covers more than 1,300 acres, and contains thirty-two miles of splendid driveways. The veterans will be housed during their stay in great tents, the largest of which covers more than 45,000 square feet. Chefs from New Orleans have been brought to assist in the work of feeding the aged soldiers. Colonel W. B. Newbill of the United States army has charge of the arrangements.

During the reunion, which ends on Friday, the United States navy and Missouri memorials in the park will be dedicated. Troops representing all branches of the military service have been brought here for the ceremonies.

Allies Add to Their Shipping Facilities

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The entente allies have increased their shipping by acquiring the Royal Mail Steam Packet company and the Lamport and

Holt lines, and also the controlling interest in the Armontine Navigation company, which owns over three hundred vessels.
