TEAM OF PONIES
AS ESSAY PRIZE

FINE SHETLAND PONIES WILL BE GIVEN FOR PRIZE WAR ESSAY TO SCHOOL CHILDREN OF OREGON BY TILLAMOOK MAN

PORTLAND, Oct. 17.—Three beautiful, high bred, Shetland ponies, the pick of the famous imported band owned by Russell Hawkins, in Tillamook County, are to be given as prizes in a war essay contest, open to all school children of Oregon. The contest is to be conducted in connection with the enrollment campaign of the United States food administration, to stimulate interest in national enrollment week, which will be October 28 to November 4, inclusive.

The ponies were secured for the purpose by Federal Food Administrator W. B. Ayer, who wired to Mr. Hawkins, now in Chicago, offering to pay shipping charges on the ponies to the railroad station nearest the winners, if Mr. Hawkins would donate the ponies. The agreement was made and the animals, which will be the best of the band, will be awarded in three divisions, for children under 11 years, children between 11 and 14 years, and those over 14 years in the high schools. Details of the contest will be announced later.

Boy Scouts Get
Behind Liberty Bonds

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 17.—Acting on request of President Wilson, the Boy Scouts of America have volunteered their services in connection with the Second Liberty loan. The Boy Scouts have a well developed national organization, which, however, does not correspond territorially to the Federal Reserve districts. 30 Locomotives Daily
Made for War Use

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 17.—The first locomotive for American war service railroads in France was completed in twenty working days, and engines of this type are now being turned out at the rate of about thirty per day. About 680 of these locomotives and over 9,000 standard gauge freight cars are on order. Other narrow gauge equipment for transportation along the battle front are also on order, and additional orders for both narrow and standard gauge equipment are likely.

The first order for war locomotives was placed with the Baldwin Locomotive company of Philadelphia on July 18th, and the first engine completed on August 9th. This is in spite of the fact that the boiler is constructed specially for this type of engine, and is what is called a "superheater." Otherwise, the locomotive is much similar to locomotives built by the Baldwin company for the English government. It is not the most powerful type used in the United States, but on a road where the heaviest engines would haul a train of about 90 loaded freight cars, this war locomotive would haul sixty loaded cars. Like all the equipment, it is painted battleship gray, and bears the letters "U. S. A." for United States army.
