IDAHO PROMI ELECTION TO HAVE RECOUNT

DES MOINES, Oct. 20.—Attorney General H. M. Havener has ordered a recount of the ballots cast in Monday's special elections on the question of constitutional prohibition. Unofficial returns give the "wets" an advantage of approximately 1,000, with a total vote of 430,000. Leaders of the "dry" faction reiterated today that an official canvass would be necessary because of the small margin given the "wets." In some quarters it is believed the official count may yet change the result.

Electric Air Heating
The following letter has been received from the Public Service Commission of Oregon, which explains the reason for the discontinuance of flat rate air heating rates:

"October 6th, 1917. California-Oregon Power Company. Klamath Falls, Oregon: Attention Geo. J. Walton, District Superintendent: Dear Sir—We noted in the issue of the Morning Oregonian for Sunday, Sept. 30th, a statement from Klamath Falls, that the managers of the Link River Electric Company were circulating a petition to be presented to the Commission asking for a reconsideration of our order in regard to air-heating rates.

We are unable to determine from the nature of the article the exact complaint which these people may have, and would appreciate any advice you may be able to give us upon the same. To avoid any misunderstanding we would suggest that, if you have not already done so, you should inform those parties interested as to the conditions which have prompted the Commission to eliminate the old rate for air-heating service. Estimates of the consumption under these flat rates by the air-heating equipment maintained by customers under the old schedule, together with consideration of the revenue obtained for this service, indicate that the company received a very small fraction of 1c per KWH of energy delivered, or, in other words, that the supply was furnished at less than the actual additional out-of-pocket cost which it produced. Under such conditions, the rate as it existed before the order was made caused an actual unjust discrimination to exist between classes of service.

One of the fundamental theories of rate-making must be that service of small value, that is for which the customer can afford to pay only small unit cost, can, without producing an unjust discrimination against other classes of service, be given a rate low enough to attract the business, provided that the same does not drop below the actual additional cost as heretofore noted.

As yet we have received no further information in regard to this petition, but desire if possible to have any misunderstanding corrected before further steps will be taken.

We will appreciate your consideration of the matters herein discussed. Yours very truly, PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION OF OREGON, By H. H. COREY, Commissioner.

We also give below an extract from their recent order effecting the rates of this company, which also explains their attitude.

"These rates (meaning air-heating rates) as applied have introduced the same inequities as flat rates for other services, and it is not possible, under such a system of charges, for the company to control the service rendered and obtain a fair return therefrom. The privilege of unlimited use is allowed and undoubtedly abused. This results in the company being compelled to furnish energy at less than the actual additional cost thereof. Flat rates for cooking energy are particularly undesirable, in that they allow the diversion of service and appliances from their intended use to that of air-heating, and correspondingly build up a peak load which may be damaging to the capacity of the utility to serve other legitimate users."
