If Your Hands Are Calloused:

Wind the handle of your broom with a strip of soft cloth, preferably cotton flannel, and tack securely in place, and your hands will not become calloused.

The Fruit Pulp.

I have heard some women say they are tired of fruit butter out of the pulp left after draining the juice for jelly. Here is a way to make a sort of fruit paste, which will keep a long time, and can be used for candy or garnishing. To one pound of fruit pulp add one pound of powdered sugar (for quince pulp, 1/2 pound, for apple 1/4 pound). If desired, the pulp from several fruits may be mixed. Rub the pulp thru a strainer before weighing it. After adding sugar,

place mixture over slow fire and cook until so thick it can be cut with knife and not run together immediately. Pour mixture half inch thick in a flat dish, which has been greased slightly with olive oil. Let stand in open window for two days, then cut into small pieces, fancy figures if desired, place on paper and sprinkle with sugar. Let stand two more days, dip in sugar again and pack between layers of oiled paper.

Another Broom Hint.

A worn out broom makes an excellent floor polisher. If cut even and rather short, and then a piece of thick felt or heavy flannel tied over the end. Use several layers of the material if it is not very heavy, and tie it very securely.

Boy Scouts Start Liberty Loan Campaign

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—The Boy Scouts of America started Saturday to take their places as workers in the nation's campaign on behalf of the second Liberty Loan. The day marked the beginning of their subscription efforts which will not be terminated until next Thursday night. The announced ambition of these 268,350 boys and their 70,000 leaders is to obtain pledges which will assure the sale of nearly \$50,000,000 worth of bonds or approximately twice the sum realized in 1916 during the four day campaign which the Boy Scouts conducted in connection with the first Liberty Loan.

Public demonstrations, special publicity efforts and services in houses of worship constituted the Boy Scout activities Saturday and yesterday. During the four days beginning today a house-to-house canvass will be made. The Boy Scouts will distribute 6,500,000 special bond posters for display in store windows and elsewhere. Camps will be set up in public parks and squares, and buglers will call attention to the poster displays. Parades will be held, together with a special patriotic demonstration on the occasion of the nation-wide celebration of Liberty Day, October 24th.

Five million application circulars will be left at the homes at which the purchasing of bonds is to be solicited. There were printed by the government, which has supplied the boys also with 300,000 manuals of bond

salesmanship. Expert salesmen will advise the Scouts in their campaign.

At the close of the first campaign 7,740 war service emblems were awarded to Boy Scouts who sold bonds in ten or more homes. These bear the seal of the treasury department. To those emblem holders who qualify in the second campaign a bar will be added. In addition, Collin H. Livingstone, president of the Boy Scouts of America, will award a gold medal to the boy who obtains the largest number of individual subscriptions, and one silver and ten bronze medals to the eleven who rank next. To the Boy Scout troop which turns in the largest number of subscriptions in each state, President Wilson will present an American flag with an appropriate streamer attached.

James E. West, chief scout executive, has informed the Boy Scouts they are carrying the message of democracy, and have a definite part to play. "You may never have another chance to do a good turn on such a scale and for such a cause as you have at this moment," he said.

DAY OF PRAYER SET

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 22.—President Wilson by proclamation has declared Sunday, October 28th, as a day of prayer for the success of American arms, in accordance with the recent resolution of congress.
