TREASURY SOLICITOR RULES THAT SPIRITS MAY NOW BE BROUGHT INTO U. S.—REVEUE BILL REPEALS FOOD BILL

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 23.—The solicitor of the treasury has decided that distilled spirits may be imported into the United States, notwithstanding the prohibition against it in the food bill.

The customs collectors have been instructed to release importations held up after the passage of the bill to the present.

The section of the revenue bill passed afterward repealed the food bill section.

Antilles Disaster Causes More Strict Censorship

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 23.—The sinking of the transport Antilles with the loss of seventy lives is believed to have followed another leak of information into Germany with regard to troop movements.

The war department has taken official cognizance of this with the issue of the following order:

"To the commanding generals of all national guard divisions: "Communicate orders to each organization commander in your division that during the time they are in federal service they are prohibited from making any report to the governor or authorities, civil or military, of their respective states, relating to any movement of their organizations or of any other federal troops or personnel."

It was recalled in this connection that some days ago a colonel of a national guard regiment reported to the governor of his state the arrival of his forces in France, with a request

that the governor publish it. This was done and the papers of the state in question announced the arrival of the contingent extensively, despite the protests of the war department to the governor.

This incident was published broadcast over the country. This publication took to the Mexican border the news that a transport with a large contingent of troops had just arrived in France. It has been practically determined that once news gets out of the United States to the south there are ways for its communication to Germany, and it is this peril that makes the government request such strict compliance with the voluntary censorship rules with regard to the movement of troops.

With the new order of the war department closing the lips of state officers and officials, and with the more complete supervision over communications imposed in the secretary of the treasury and censorship board by the trading with the enemy act, it is not believed that the mishap can occur again.

Government Wants Supply of Typists

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 23.—Now that Uncle Sam has the young men of the country in training for military service, he finds that he needs 10,000 typewriter operators and stenographers and typewriters, both men and women, for the departments at Washington.

The Civil Service Commission has notified all of its 3,000 boards of examiners that they should put forth their best efforts to secure these urgently needed workers. While examinations are now held weekly in 450 cities, the commission states that arrangements will be made to have an examination held at any accessible

place where a small class of applicants can be secured. The entrance salaries range from \$1,000 to \$1,200 a year. Promotion is reasonably rapid to those whose services prove satisfactory. No appointments can be made to these or other positions in the federal classified civil service unless authorized by the Civil Service Commission under civil service law.

Any information to the contrary is unauthorized. This is a splendid opportunity to serve your country. Full information may be secured from the secretary of the board of civil service examiners at the postoffice in your city.

MEXICANS SWELL RED CROSS FUNDS AT EL PASO

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 23.—Mexican participation, both official and unofficial, in the Festival of the Allies held here recently under the auspices of the local chapter of the Red Cross, came as a surprise, and was one of the most gratifying features of the occasion.

Crowds attended daily, and the proceeds netted the Red Cross more than \$6,000. Because of Mexico's position of neutrality, no requests were made for booths or other exhibits from the southern republic, but General Francisco Murguia ordered his military band of eighty pieces to play nightly at the festival. Hundreds of the most prominent residents of Jaures attended, while young Mexican girls and boys gave typical native dances in the

"Street of Nations" for the benefit of the fund. Jaures also subscribed liberally to the Red Cross fund.

TEN ACRES DECLARED SUFFICIENT FOR FAMILY

BILLINGS, Mont., Oct. 23.—Ten acres is enough to support a family, according to Miss Mattie Johnson, who has tried it. She has divided her ten acres as follows: Two acres for strawberries and raspberries; two acres for wheat for chickens; three acres for alfalfa for cattle, hogs and horses; one acre for corn for chickens and hogs; one-half acre for vegetable garden; one-half acre for yards for 100 or 200 chickens; one-half acre for home, barns and yards. Apple, plum and cherry trees are planted in the chicken yard and about the fields. Bees, also, may be kept at a profit, she says.
