Uncle Sam Begg For Cooperation

County School Superintendent Outlines Some of the Food Problems Confronting the People of the Nation. Suggestions Made for Meeting Them

In a few days every patron of the public schools of Oregon will receive an appeal thru the public school pupils to ally himself with the nationwide movement for food conservation.

During the week of October 28th the federal food administrator will make an attempt to get a pledge card in every one of the 22,000,000 American homes.

One of the biggest problems confronting the United States and the allies is the food problem. We must feed our own soldiers as well as the men of France and England if we are to win the war. Wheat, beef, pork, dairy products and sugar must be conserved if the supply is to be adequate for the coming winter.

Autocracy dictates the food ration for every man, woman and child, while democracy, we feel, needs but to make the appeal to patriotism in order to accomplish the same result. Many of us can not buy Liberty Bonds, many of us are not fit for the service at the front, but there are none who cannot aid every day in the conservation of the nation's food supply.

When your boy or girl brings home the federal food administration pledge card, together with the home card, remember that these cards are appeals direct to you from your country. Do not pass them up lightly, but read carefully the home card and then sign the pledge card and send it back to the teacher. You will then be sent a beautifully lithographed membership card, which should be placed in a conspicuous window, so it may serve as a badge of your loyalty in these trying times.

Remember that you are asked to do no more than every other American.

It is understood that the wife and the mother are the ones who should sign the pledge cards, but they should have the help and sympathy of every member of the family, for to fail to cooperate in this matter is to be a food slacker.

General Suggestions

- 1—Buy less; cook no more than necessary; serve smaller portions.
- 2—Use local and seasonable supplies.
- 3—Patronize your local producers

Kaiser's Attempts to Bunco Russians, Shown

LONDON, Oct. 24.—The manner in which the German higher command encouraged fraternization between Russian soldiers and Germans, even before the date of the Russian revolution, and the use to which they put this fraternization, is shown in an army order recently captured on the front of General Linsingen's army. It was issued shortly before Easter, and is as follows:

"In view of the approaching holidays, judging from the example of former years, it is expected that Russians will come out to us with pres-

ents. Their emissaries are to be well received, and allowed to return to their own lines. Conversations, however, may only be carried on by officers. Our officers, in such conversations, will take advantage of opportunities to point out to the Russians that those really guilty of the war are England and France, that Germany and Austria have twice already made peace proposals which Russia wished to accept, and only refused because of the influence of England. Do not touch tactical questions; when he has drunk a little he will begin to let things out."

If you are not one who can be reached thru the public schools in this campaign be ready for the committee of outside workers who will call on you. Don't forget that in unity and complete co-operation there is strength; in a conserved and properly administered food supply there is victory; and in victory there is the triumph of democracy and the dawn of world peace. Do your part.

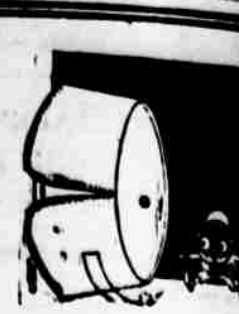

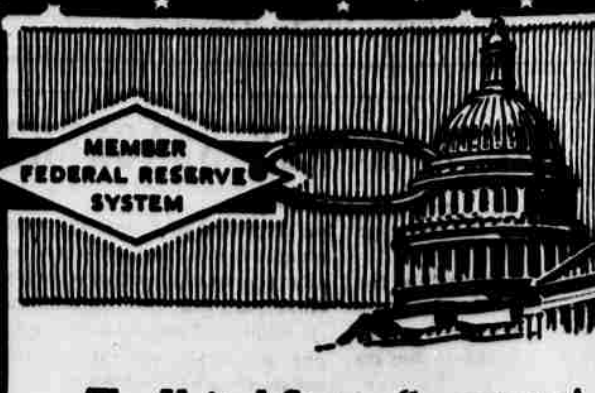
