BOB FITZSIMMONS

Bob Fitzsimmons, the famous old fighter, perhaps the greatest fighter that ever lived, died this week of pneumonia in Chicago. For years he has been traveling and playing in vaudeville, and he has not taken good care of himself. Fitzsimmons, who was 55 years of age, was in his time middleweight, light heavyweight and heavyweight champion. He won the heavyweight championship when he beat Jim Corbett, March 17, 1897, at Carson City, Nev. He lost his title to Jim Jeffries.
