

Vice-Prest. Marshall Begins Speaking Tour

AULT, Colo., Oct. 29.—Thomas B. Marshall, vice president of the United States, this afternoon began at Ault, a speaking tour in behalf of the war. It is to continue until November 22d, and will lead him as far as the Pacific Northwest and back to Butte, Mont. The vice president's general subject at each stopping place will be the same: "Why America Entered the War and What We Must Do to Win It," the he will make digressions to discuss special phases of the matter of interest in the places where he is speaking.

The itinerary of the tour follows: October 29, Ault, and Denver, Colo. October 31, Grand Junction, Colo. November 2, Kemmerer, Wyo. November 3, Boise, Idaho. November 8, Aberdeen, Wash. Germans Responsible For Greek Deportations

ATHENS, Greece, Oct. 5.—(Correspondence)—Greek authorities have received information which convinces them that not alone the Turk, but his German advisors, were responsible for the deportations of the Greeks from Turkish dominions, as a consequence of which 700,000 have suffered persecution or death. It is asserted that the Greek legation at Constantinople protested to the then King Constantine of Greece

from the beginning of the deportations, but received no assistance or encouragement from him. The legation then lodged a protest with Talat Pasha, the Turkish grand vizier. His reply, as shown by official papers, was that "these measures were taken by advice of our German advisors." The Greek legation then took up the subject with the German general, Liman von Sanders, who is declared to have replied that the pres-

ence of the Greek communities within the Ottoman empire was dangerous to military operations, and that he was only "executing the orders of the German general staff."

An account of the persecution of the Greeks which has been given to the Associated Press states:

"The method of depopulation adopted has been very similar to the method adopted with regard to the Armenian races. During the night armed irregular troops of the Turkish army would form a cordon around the doomed district. The inhabitants would be awakened by means of bells and ordered to evacuate the village in ten minutes, for military reasons. No extension of time was allowed, one object being that the victims should not be able to take anything with them, either food or goods. In the event of delay, the troops drove forth the terrified people at the point of the bayonet.

"The moment that the people had gone, hordes of bandits and irregular soldiery poured into the empty villages and looted and burned the houses in a frenzy of destruction, while the inhabitants, old men, women and children, as well as the able-bodied, were on the march.

MEATLESS DAY NAMED BY CENTRAL LABOR COUNCIL

PORTLAND, Oct. 29.—The Central Labor Council here has passed resolutions unanimously endorsing the patriotic move for the establishment of every Tuesday as a meatless day and every Wednesday as a wheatless day. The council agreed to back up the hotel and restaurant men in this action. All members were requested to give preference to public eating places which abide by the rules laid down by the food commissioner.

UNCOMMON MITE NOW INVADES OREGON ORCHARDS

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 29.—Mites which spin a fine web about an entire orchard tree and then attack its foliage, are reported to A. L. Lovett, entomologist of the Oregon Agricultural experiment station from the vicinity of Milton, Freewater, La Grande and Portland and from Vancouver, Wash. Prof. Lovett says the invasion is of unusual interest to orchardists. The pest is not the common orchard mite, he declares, but a species not previously thought serious. From present indications it seems advisable for growers to watch for this mite. The leaves it attacks turn yellow and then fall to the ground.

Where the mite is present, two applications of spray are suggested. One should be made in the fall just as soon as the foliage drops from the tree, and the second in the spring when the buds are swelling well, but the leaves are not out. Only the trees showing infestation need the fall application.

Commercial lime-sulphur at 1-to-12 strength is used for both applications.
