**COUNTY COURT
HEARS PETITION**

**WATER USERS ASSOCIATION
WANTS TO CREATE IRRIGATION DISTRICT—MANY ADVANTAGES POSSIBLE UNDER IT**

The County Court yesterday heard the petition of the directors and members of the Klamath Water Users for the creation of the Klamath Irrigation district, to replace the Water Users Association.

The new form of organization is the united desire of nearly all the water users under the Klamath project, and is endorsed by the officials of the reclamation service. It is believed that when the change is completed it will be possible for the farmers under the project to obtain money under the new federal loan system, and that the cost of the water will be more evenly distributed among all holding land under the ditch, than at present.

Nearly all the government irrigation systems throughout the nation are adopting the district form of organization. The court has not yet announced the result of the hearing.
