**ONE ROBBER COVERS THREE
MEN UNMASKED, TAKES SMALL
HANDFUL OF BILLS AND ES-
CAPES ON BICYCLE**

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 30.—A lone robber held up the officers of the First National bank here, securing \$200 in bills, and escaped by means of a bicycle.

He appeared at the tellers window, covered President C. L. Scott, D. B. Hall and L. K. Page with two guns, and demanded money. Scott invited him to help himself.

He left a large amount of gold, silver and currency on the counter, and with a small handful of bills. It is believed that he was insane. He is young, and unmasked.
