Eastern Markets Open
To American Trade

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 31.—Salesmen of the large local exporting firms who have returned from the Orient report that the markets in the Far East are wide open to American trade from Singapore to Vladivostok. At no time has there been a greater demand for American goods than now exists, and a number of the men have returned with orders in excess of the capacity of their houses to fill.

One salesman, who recently went out from here with two or three good lines, cleaned up several thousand dollars a month for several months in commissions. From crackers to bathing suits and bathtubs, all sorts of merchandise are in demand, and there seems to be little that the energetic salesman is not capable of selling. Cash orders are said to be coming in so fast that the boggy of long time credits no longer bothers anybody. In fact, exporting houses have found that the cash orders are more than sufficient to tax their output to capacity, and they are therefore passing up the credit orders.

Contrary to the general impression, the goods are being forwarded in appreciable quantity, notwithstanding the scarcity of shipping facilities. While a scarcity of bottoms exists, there is sufficient available to keep the goods moving. Much of this trade is going to China to replace English and German lines.

FAIL IN THEIR DESIGN

ASTORIA, Oct. 31.—The district exemption board has upheld the local board in its recent decision, refusing the granting of passports to six men who wanted to escape the draft by returning to their native lands. The district board's action was unanimous and it approved the reasons given by the local board for refusing the desired permission. The men involved were: Adolph Steen Alsos, John Cholberg, Thomas Andreas Iverson, Boring Johanson, Wilhelm Skang and Andre W. Svenson.

INSIDE "DOPE ON PLACING BETS"

BOULDER, Colo., Oct. 31.—"If you are going to gamble, bet on your country and not on football games." This was the advice given to students at chapel exercises at the University of Colorado by Acting President Dr. George Norlin, following the defeat of the Colorado team by Denver University.

"Buy a Liberty bond if you have money to spare, and do not throw away your dollars in a practice which is bad for your team and the great game of football," Dr. Norlin continued. "In these days of sacrifice and self denial it is a poor time for college men to be staking their dollars on the outcome of a football game. There are too many good uses for our money these days."

GERMAN AIR RAID FIZZLES

LONDON, Oct. 31.—Ford French has announced that the German airplanes which attempted to carry out a raid last night on the southeast counties of England did no material damage, and that no casualties resulted from it.

The British machines which engaged the raiders all landed safely.

AGED WOMAN HONORED

TOKIO, Oct. 31.—Miss Julia N. Crosby of Yokohama has been invested with the Order of the Blue Ribbon by the Japanese emperor. Miss Crosby is 84 years old, and for forty-six years has been engaged in the work of the Woman's Union Missionary Society. The honor is conferred in recognition of her labors in the education of Japanese girls, as well as of her work of charity. Miss Crosby is the oldest daughter of the late Prof. Henry William Crosby of New York.
