LARGE LIBERTY BOND BOUGHT

O. E. Peyton of this city is in receipt of a copy of a letter from Alva R. Atwood, acting district sales manager of the Union Oil company, to the First State and Savings bank, as follows:

"Gentlemen—Herewith find our check No. 6586 for \$50, for which we would thank you to reserve for us one \$1,000 bond.—Alva R. Atwood."

Last week Mr. Atwood talked with Mr. Peyton by phone, and agreed that for each bond purchased by a member of the Union Oil company the company itself would buy double the number; also that it would purchase outright the bonds for the employees and allow them to return the money to the company on the installment plan. 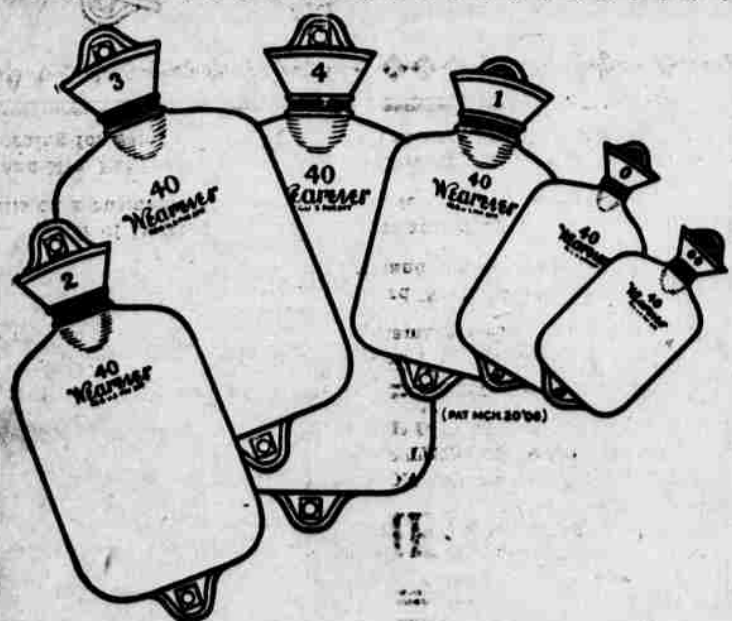
