Showed Rival His Best Knockout

After Bob Fitzsimmons, the great-glove fighter the ring has known, with the possible exception of Jim Driscoll, the British marvel, had in his old age been defeated the second time by Jim Jeffries, he said he would show the latter all his wonderful tricks. This photograph, taken then, shows Jeffries landing the solar plexus punch of Fitz, just as Fitz landed it on Jim Corbett, March 17, 1897, and thereby won the heavyweight championship of the world. It was Fitzsimmons' greatest blow. But Jeffries never was able to acquire the knack, and never did much with it.

State Reserve Rentals
Total Nearly \$100,000

SALEM, Nov. 3.—Oregon's forest reserve rental fund will total \$98,681.18, according to advices received from the federal government by Assistant State Treasurer Ryan. This sum will be apportioned among the counties in which reserves are located, and 75 per cent used for road construction. The remaining 25 per cent will be used for the school fund. The following are the sums received by the state from each reserve:
